

Care Facility Services Thank-You: As part of our "Satellite Services" at the Care Centers, we have recently started providing printed bulletins and a DVD to have a virtual service at HeatherWood Assisted Living and Memory Care. Update on Messiah School Reopening Plans:

The Board of Education continues to work toward reopening our school. Several options are being considered; the following is a summary from the sub-committee for reopening.

LUTHERAN SCHOOL

In-person Plan - Our goal is to start with in-

person, socially distanced instruction for K-8 students for five days a week. In order for this to work we will need to spread our classroom space (making use of the fellowship hall and church sanctuary) and add enough teaching hours to cover our fourth grade students each afternoon—this will require Voter consideration.

Hybrid or Online Only Plan - The faculty is preparing to begin in-person but is also exploring ways to provide learning opportunities for students that are quarantined at home while in-person instruction is happening at school. If the situation arises where we are unable to continue with in-person learning we plan to use the same distance learning format that we used in the spring, incorporating improvements.

We still have many questions about how the school day will look, but here is a preview of what it could look like:

- There will be screening requirements for students to be at school.
- We may be required to restrict parent access to the school building.
- The bus company is encouraging families to drive students to school, leaving space on the buses for students whose parents can't drive them to school.
- Students will probably need to wear masks during hallway transitions, but not during socially-distanced classroom instruction.
- How recess will function is still a question; more information about guidelines will be forthcoming from the health department.

Other notes - The Board will be considering the possibility of pushing back the start of our school year because of the extra preparations that are necessary this year and the uncertainty of the part-time position request. If we end up using the fellowship hall for an upper grade classroom it will be difficult to offer PreK. We do not know if we will be able to offer school programs like Lego league, athletics, choir or band.

Ways to Help - The school will be in need of items such as extra masks, tissue packs, and hand sanitizer, and disinfectant wipes. We will also need to add a substantial amount of technology to prepare for potential hybrid instruction. We may also need extra help transitioning students between vehicles and school – before and after school. Outreach Efforts: Some of our long-standing projects have been sidetracked: VBS, parades, Northern Wisconsin State Fair, Here We Grow Again. Yet our fellow human beings need the Gospel now as much as before. And the present health crisis has caught people's attention and they are eager for good news and hope and comfort. There is no greater news in the world than the message that Jesus has conquered sin and death and hands out freely eternal life. With this in mind the Outreach Committee is trying three projects: 1) Finish the installation of the Little Church Libraries (see the one down by the church mailbox). We have two members waiting for one, but have four that could still go out. Are you interested? 2) Podcast: The Committee is making our weekly sermon audio podcasts more accessible by distributing them to various platforms such as Itunes, Google play, Spotify, etc. 3) Promotion in the newspaper and on social media of our pamphlet entitled "Bible-Centered Devotions, for the Person who Wants to Know More about God and Life with God." And of course, we encourage all of our members to be ready to give an answer to the hope that we have in Jesus Christ. (1 Peter 3:15) Pray for the spread of the Gospel in these trying times.

Highlights from the July 16, 2020 Church Council meeting:

The meeting began at 6:30 pm with a devotion based on Psalm 13. There were 10 members present, including church officers, board chairmen and pastors. <> Elders: Changes to our church family: transfer in of Bethanie Gantt and Prof. Mark Weis, both from St. Luke's, Lemmon, SD.; transfer out of

Jacob, Dani, Zoey, Emmy, Clara, and Charlie Ohlmann to Grace, Valentine NE; and Bryan, Hannah, Hailey, Avdan, Riley, and Jayse Hallahan to Peace thru Christ, Middleton, WI. Motion carried to recommend to voters the termination of Jacob. Andrew, and Samuel Gullerud by bylaw 2.08c at their request. Peter Johnston has completed instruction, requested membership, and received as a communicant member by Council resolution. Motion carried to bring to the voters the reinstatement of the membership of Burgess and Janice Huehn by bylaw 2.09 at their request. With deacons, the elders have been addressing concerns for member safety in church due to COVID. \Leftrightarrow Deacons: we are getting back to a regular service schedule. We are not currently pursuing 60th anniversary activities or pictorial directory, but will defer these to 2021. We declined to host the ILC choir concert at church the night before ILHS graduation, due to COVID concerns. The church picnic is moving forward on August 9th. We recently purchased a new camera to improve quality of service streaming. A church Security Committee has been meeting and putting plans in place to secure our facility during worship services. <> Pastors: The pastors continue to meet weekly to coordinate schedules and vacations. Pastor Naumann is guest preaching at Fridley this weekend. Adult instruction classes have been hit and miss. Pastor Naumann will teach catechism and Pastor Schaller will teach Bible History this school year. The church camping trip is coming up July 24-26. Pastor Naumann will go to Rochester for the committal service for Phyliss Green on July 25. A new summer sermon series begins that weekend of July 25-26, entitled "First Things First." Pastors have been working with members on a number of difficult counseling situations. <> Outreach: We are podcasting audio from sermons. More "Little Church Libraries" are ready to be installed. We are designing a new VBS yard sign that's more durable, using money that would have been spent on other cancelled events. <> **Property:** Disinfection and cleaning occurs between services and as requested. Each group that meets is responsible for cleaning after their own meeting. Monthly workdays are restarting this month on Saturday, July 25th. <> Board of Education and Principal: The August VBS session cancelled, we are coordinating the distribution of materials. We are looking into in-person SS. The school athletics schedule for the fall is uncertain. There are plans to replace two classroom

windows. The School work day will be on Saturday, August 8. The Board accepted nonmember enrollment of Jasper Zona in PreK, however, due to COVID space needs it is not certain that PreK will be held. The school is looking at getting Chromebooks for all upper graders from the "textbooks" line item of MSF funds for about \$6-8K. The Board of Education, Principal, and Faculty have been working to develop a plan for the reopening of the school. The goal is to begin with inperson, socially distanced, instruction. To make this work it looks like classrooms will need to be moved around and the fellowship hall and church will need to be used for classrooms. For this plan to be implemented the teaching staff would need to be increased by a part-time position to allow lower-grades to be single level for the entire school day. There are six applicants so far for the school secretary position. <> Treasurer: For the first 6 months of 2020, receipts are up about \$15,000 over last year and disbursements are up about \$2,000 over last year. We have received 48% of budgeted needs through June (same as last year). have spent 46% of the budget. CBP offerings are up about \$8,000 over last year, and are at 50% of our goal. Total receipts are up 5% over last year. Some funds are down from last year, like the Messiah School fund and the Messiah ILHS Student Grant Fund. Comparison of 2019 to 2020 during shutdown; home budget contributions are \$10.000 higher than last year and CBP is up \$5,700. <> PPP loan: A motion carried to recommend to the voters that we vote, by paper ballot, either to return the PPP money now or keep it for potential use. <> **Building Committee:** The Committee is narrowing down the design. They have met again with the architect and builders, and are getting input from subcontractors. At the July 26 Voters' Meeting they will present a drawing that represents layout and a better cost estimate. The next decision on this project will likely be December when we have completed plans. We hope to be able to begin construction in the spring of 2021. <> The next Council meeting is scheduled for Monday. August 17th at 6:30 pm. <> A Special Voter's meeting is scheduled for July 26th at 6:30 pm. <> The meeting adjourned at 8:45 pm with the Lord's Prayer & Benediction.

CLC Call News: Pastor Richard Kanzenbach, Morning Star, Fairchild; Peace with God, Onalaska; and Trinity, Millston, WI has accepted the call to St. Luke's, Lemmon SD.

ILC Maintenance Position: A full-time position has opened in the maintenance department of ILC following the faithful service of John Fox. In service to the LORD and for the welfare of our students, the responsibilities include: 1) the maintenance and improvement of the grounds and roads on the campus (e.g., mowing, tree trimming, plowing, road repair, etc.); 2) the repair, maintenance, and improvements of the buildings on the campus (e.g., equipment maintenance, plumbing, electrical, furnace and boiler care, building improvements, furniture repair, etc.); and 3) being available for certain scheduled 'on call' evenings, nights, weekends, and holidays. Those who are interested may contact Prof. Dan Schierenbeck (dan.schierenbeck@ilc.edu/660.864.9231) who can provide more

details along with compensation. Applications will start being reviewed on August 15, 2020.

A group trip to Israel is planned for January 13-22, 2021 with a possible three day extension to Jordan for those interested. Currently 17 members of CLC congregations are registered for the trip, and over a dozen more have expressed interest. The tour company is expecting that our tour will be possible, but they do have options available for us if it has to be cancelled. You are invited to join this group as we see the places where God stepped into History to fulfill His plan of salvation for sinners! The trip will include visits to Caesarea, Mt. Carmel, Nazareth, Cana, Capernaum, Jerusalem, the Dead Sea, En Gedi and more. We will visit traditional sites associated with Jesus' ministry as well as those of the prophets and apostles. 

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; July 27-Aug. 1, '20.

Mon Isaiah 55:10-11 This earthly illustration gets us thinking about cause and effect (10). Plants depend on water (the universal solvent) to transport vital nutrients to their roots, nourishing them to produce fruit and seeds for consumers. Which illustrates how God sends His word down from heaven to transport His grace and mercy so that souls may flourish, grow to maturity, and bear fruit to eternal life. That's why we drink God's Word.

Tues Matthew 13:1-9 From a floating pulpit Jesus gave an agronomy lesson. More specifically, a lesson about the grain farmer suffering loss of seed; loss by predatory birds, loss in stony soil, and loss by competition from weeds. So why bother farming? Because when seed does fall on good/cultivated soil, God sees to it that seed can overcome all obstacles and flourish to harvest (8). Human survival depends on God's hand in the process. Stay tuned.

Wed Romans 8:18-25 During our own season of growth, we hear ourselves groaning, lamenting, and sighing—and for good reason. We put up with our aches and pains, our shortages, our losses—because we see light at the end of the tunnel. We groan within ourselves because we want to get past the barriers; we are eager for our reunion with our Lord and Savior, Jesus, who has promised that we can be WITH Him, fully and forever. Yes and Amen!

Thurs Psalm 65 approaches God with <u>praise</u>—praise especially because God has provided atonement for our transgressions (1-4). We ask Him to find time for us (5) among His other activities as Creator (6-8) and Preserver of life via H_2O (9-10). We depend on God to keep Earth in orbit season after season, to bless pasture, vineyard, orchard, and grassland—which join us in praising You, O God, in this little corner of Your kingdom (11-13). Hallelujah!

Fri Matthew 13:18-23 The success ratio for God's Word may seem low, for His Word gets discarded by lack of understanding, is thwarted by ungodly appetite, stunted by passing fancies, and suffocated under adversities. Yet God doesn't quit broadcasting His Word, for success comes wherever people read the Bible, understand what God is doing via Jesus, are nourished by the Spirit, and produce fruits of faith. Thanks be to God!

Sat Acts 14:1-18 Now it happened is an understatement, for Jesus was seeing to it that His Word was sown, sprouted, and bore fruit (1). However, wherever Jesus is winning souls, Satan stirs up trouble (2-4), and soon the missionaries realized it was time to move on (6-7). Lesson #1 for idolaters: Jesus is responsible for performing genuine miracles (8-11); Lesson #2: Idolatry and God's religion are incompatible, as is perfectly clear to those who know God—though it's not clear to those who don't (12-18).
