Old Testament Reading......Jonah 3:1-10

¹ Now the word of the LORD came to Jonah the second time, saying, 2 "Arise, go to Nineveh, that great city, and preach to it the message that I tell you." 3 So Jonah arose and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the LORD. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly great city, a three-day journey in extent. ⁴ And Jonah began to enter the city on the first day's walk. Then he cried out and said, "Yet forty days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" 5 So the people of Nineveh believed God, proclaimed a fast, and put on sackcloth, from the greatest to the least of them. ⁶ Then word came to the king of Nineveh; and he arose from his throne and laid aside his robe, covered himself with sackcloth and sat in ashes. 7 And he caused it to be proclaimed and published throughout Nineveh by the decree of the king and his nobles. saying, Let neither man nor beast, herd nor flock, taste anything; do not let them eat, or drink water. 8 But let man and beast be covered with sackcloth, and cry mightily to God; yes, let every one turn from his evil way and from the violence that is in his hands. 9 Who can tell if God will turn and relent, and turn away from His fierce anger, so that we may not perish? 10 Then God saw their works, that they turned from their evil way; and God relented from the disaster that He had said He would bring upon them, and He did not do it.

²² Then Paul stood in the midst of the Areopagus and said, "Men of Athens, I perceive that in all things you are very religious; ²³ for as I was passing through and considering the objects of your worship, I even found an altar with this inscription: TO THE UNKNOWN GOD. Therefore, the One whom

you worship without knowing, Him I proclaim to you: 24 God, who made the world and everything in it, since He is Lord of heaven and earth, does not dwell in temples made with hands. ²⁵ Nor is He worshiped with men's hands, as though He needed anything, since He gives to all life, breath, and all things. ²⁶ And He has made from one blood every nation of men to dwell on all the face of the earth, and has determined their preappointed times and the boundaries of their dwellings, 27 so that they should seek the Lord, in the hope that they might grope for Him and find Him, though He is not far from each one of us; ²⁸ for in Him we live and move and have our being, as also some of your own poets have said, 'For we are also His offspring,' 29 Therefore, since we are the offspring of God, we ought not to think that the Divine Nature is like gold or silver or stone, something shaped by art and man's devising. 30 Truly, these times of ignorance God overlooked. but now commands all men evervwhere repent, ³¹ because He has appointed a day on which He will judge the world in righteousness by the Man whom He has ordained. He has given assurance of this to all by raising Him from the dead." 32 And when they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some mocked, while others said, "We will hear you again on this matter." ³³ So Paul departed from among them. ³⁴ However. some men joined him and believed, among them Dionysius the Areopagite, a woman named Damaris, and others with them.



General Fund – December offerings of \$101,036 (incl a special gift of \$23,000) vs disbursements of \$73,291, resulting in a net gain, reducing our operating deficit by \$27,745. Regular & special General Fund CBP offerings over the last several months have reduced a -\$72,440 deficit by \$51,000. Praise the Lord for moving hearts to remember our General Fund needs, and blessing their resources to support it, since it gives major subsidy for the work of our Boards of Trustees, Regents, Missions, & Ed/Publications. Looking down the Balance column above, our aggregate balance was blessed with \$474,310 in revenue in December, described in the following reports.

ILC Operations – ILC revenue of \$114,476 (incl \$49,500 subsidy) vs disbursements of \$112,947, a net flow of \$1,529. Halfway through the fiscal year, disbursements are \$59,000 under budget needs.

ILC Building Projects – Dec. receipts were \$84,005 vs disbursements of \$2,805 for the Building Planning Committee expenses. Receipts for the month included \$995 in offerings and \$83,009 in earnings & final revenue transfers to the fund to close out the donated CRT. The Planning Committee is moving forward with a recommendation for consideration by our next CLC Convention this June for a new gym and repurposing the 50-year-old gym for ILC chapels, band/choir practices, plays, musicals, and CLC Conventions & large gatherings. Praise, Oh, Praise, our God and King!

CEF – December revenue was \$333,000 (including \$275,868 investment gains and \$57,062 from CEF loan repayments, including a congregation mortgage retirement) vs disbursements of \$10,848 in debt service & monthly admin expenses. The \$3.5 million balance may be needed in the near term for several large CLC & congregational loans which are anticipated.

MDF – December offerings of \$38,307 (including special offerings of \$1,500 & \$26,000) vs disbursements of \$13,146, which includes the 7th \$10,000 construction loan installment (of 12 planned) for the Nepal Bible Institute classroom, & \$2,000 for an India CLCI parsonage repair.

IIF – December revenue of \$13,179 (investment gains of \$11,189 thru Dec, congregation offerings of \$990, and a special offering of \$1,000) vs \$0 disbursements.

Kinship – Congregation offerings of \$5,794, specials \$4,235, sponsors \$9,765 vs \$150 for widows.

Good Stewardship Tax Deduction Info: A CLC pastor recently shared this information and it seemed wise to pass it on: The CARES Act included a provision to claim up to \$300 in charitable contributions in 2020 even if you claim the standard deduction. This is an "above the line" deduction, which means it is subtracted from gross income and does all kinds of good stuff to your final tax bill. The deduction is taken on Line 10b of the 2020 Form 1040. Cash contributions to churches qualify. Obviously, you will need records to verify, but your year-end statement from your financial secretary satisfies that requirement. Saving cancelled checks (or images thereof) is also recommended.

- <> The meeting began at 7:20 pm with a devotion based on Psalm 20. There were 8 members present, including church chairmen. officers. board <> Elders: We are still working with a member who is living in impenitent sin, whose soul care will be discussed at the Annual Meeting. Changes to our church family: transfer out of Rhiannon Roehl (cs) to Berea, Inver Grove Heights, MN. Termination: motions carried to recommend to the voters include termination of Melissa née Otte (Parker) Owen by 2.08d (unable to contact); Maggie Caird, Lindsey (nee Matysik) Johnson and Rayne Reetz by 2.08c (request for release). Potential termination of Chong, Ger, and Mai Ka Vang will be announced at the Jan. 31 Voters' meeting, for action on Feb. 23. Baptisms: Skylar Kristyl Raine Sandhoefner, baptized 12/13/20; Cassandra Marie Bennett Richard Schlegelmilch. <> Deacons: We continue to work on COVID-19 1/17/21. safety measures. The new hymnal committee is meeting and will report back. We are proposing service schedule adjustments for Lent and Easter. We are also exploring post-COVID options for Communion distribution.
- **Pastors:** all pastors have recovered from COVID, and two are scheduled for vaccinations. There will be no pulpit exchange for this year's Lenten season. Ted Thurow, Nona Schaller, and Mike Markus are all recuperating back at home. Pastor Tiefel is planning a trip to visit some members at a distance. <> **Outreach:** We are trying to be flexible with planning this year due to COVID and the potential building project. We are planning an evangelism webinar for the spring. We plan to put out a trifold handout for the congregation in March. <> **Property:** Tom Beekman has finished siding the shed, and the roof will be shingled
- **Board of Education and Principal:** We are discussing possible options for summer VBS in view of the building project. Info for at-home Sunday school is being made available. The CLC grade school basketball tournament has been cancelled for 2021. New rug runners were purchased and will be installed. We are working on teacher/staff appreciation for Kâren Franson, Carrie Reim, & Paul Tiefel III, who have served for many years. The Board has requested initial slates from the CLC president to fill Mrs. Reim & Mr. Tiefel's positions. One new kindergarten student has enrolled. <> **Treasurer:** A motion passed to approve the current list of bills for payment as presented.

General fund total receipts for 2020 were \$713K disbursements were \$693K, so our balance went up. Total receipts were about \$9,500 more than 2019. Missions received \$189K, slightly under our CBP estimate of \$190K. Messiah ILHS Student Aid Fund has had a deficit for the last few months. Our budget for 2021 compared to what we received in 2020 requires an increase of about \$65K (9%); if we move forward with the building project, this will increase even Miscellaneous: The Building Committee received a timetable for construction that stretches into the fall. We are working on keeping within budget as much as possible. The Building Committee and the Finance/Publicity committee meet on 1/21. The Council discussed the report from the CLC Board of Trustees on the needs for our mutual work in the CLC. This report will be presented at the Annual Meeting on 1/31. They are asking for a 13.5% increase over 2020. A motion passed to propose to the voters a CBP estimate of \$200,000 (our 2020 estimate was \$190,000). <> The next Council meeting is scheduled for February 18th at 6:30 pm. Our Annual Voter's Meeting is scheduled for Sunday, January 31st at 6:30. A Special Voter's Meeting is scheduled for Sunday, February 21st at 6:30 pm to Building Committee report, teacher necessary). and membership items. The adjourned at 8:30 pm with the Lord's Prayer and Benediction.

He Shall Reign Forever and Ever!

The approach of the year 2000 has caused much excitement, with people expecting great changes in our world. Some are hoping for great new things to happen in the next millennium. Others are forecasting fearful things. But as we survey the world scene at the beginning of this new year, what we see is a world in which the passage of time changes things very little.

One feature of the world scene that does not really change is the constant struggle for power. The mighty of this world--and those who want to be mighty--are vying with one another for power. This was so a thousand years ago, and it is safe to say that this situation will not change as long as the world stands. There will always be struggles for power, by legitimate and illegitimate means. The mighty of this world will rise, and they will fall.

There is really only one significant and lasting change in power that has taken place in this world. It happened with the coming of the Son of God as the world's Savior, an event that established the Christian era. This great change was announced by John the Baptist when he proclaimed: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

The Son of God had come to wrest power from Satan who had gained power over mankind when he successfully tempted Eve and then Adam. And Jesus did defeat Satan and robbed him of his power over mankind. He took upon Himself our sins, the source of Satan's power over us, so that Satan can no longer accuse us or force us to follow him and be condemned with him.

It is important for us as we begin this new year to remember that it doesn't matter so much who occupies the seats of power in this world. What matters is that there is one who is above them all, whose throne is forever: Jesus Christ, who is King of kings and Lord of lords.

It is to Him that we owe allegiance above all others in authority, for He alone is worthy "to receive power and riches and wisdom, and strength and honor and *glory and blessing!"* (Rev. 5:12). It is to Him that we can look at all times for salvation and for help in every need, for He is the one who "by Himself purged our sins, (and) sat down at the right hand of the majesty on high" (Heb. 1:3).

This same Jesus who died for us and rose again, who is Lord and King even now and reigns at the right hand of God, will come again and reveal His kingdom before all.

Now, much of mankind denies the kingship of Jesus. They do not acknowledge Him as their Lord or as their Savior. This is true even of many who speak well of Him as a good man and as a fine example of how people ought to live; they still don't regard Him as their Lord or think they need Him as their Savior. But the day will come when He will appear again, this time in glory as the Judge of all. Then every eye will see Him in His glory as King of kings and Lord of lords. Then every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father. When He arrives it will be too late for those who have denied Him now in this life. They will be forced to admit His Lordship to their own condemnation.

What a blessed privilege it is for us to know Him and believe in Him as Lord and Savior now in this our time of grace. To us the kingship of Jesus is a great comfort. Jesus in whom we trust is Lord. He died for us to redeem us from sin and condemnation. He lives to bring us safely to

the end of our days and to take us to be with Him. When He comes again in glory it will be to welcome us into the eternal mansions that He has prepared for those who love Him.

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; Jan. 25-30, '21.

Mon Jonah 3:1-4:1 God had spared Jonah for good reason: Go to Nineveh and preach to it the message that I tell you. So Jonah trekked overland 400 miles to metro Nineveh and proclaimed its downfall via God's hand—which scared them enough to believe God, turn from their evil behavior, and hope that God would relent. God did relent—so that Jonah could assure souls already humbled that God forgave them their sins. That's God's M.O.!

Tues Mark 1:14-20 It was Jesus' M.O. too: exhort the sinner to repent, then deliver the good news that God has a way to save you from disaster. God had prepared Simon and Andrew spiritually and emotionally to leave their secular employment and let Jesus prepare them to carry His message. Same with James and John. When Jesus calls, God promotes repentant hearts to turn their lives around -- and the world will never be the same again.

Wed 1 Corinthians 7:29-31 Our world is changing, too, in ways we don't understand—so we need to adjust our personal lives to meet the challenges, control our emotions to suit each situation, monitor our financial endeavors, and make use of every opportunity to salvage what can be salvaged from the impending disaster.

Lord, have mercy on our generation!

Thurs Psalm 62 David's psalm starts on an island of calmness (1-2) before he attacks the hostiles (3-4). Now, whom does he have "at his back"? *God alone, his Rock and Salvation, his defense and refuge* (5-7) – and not for him alone (8). In balance, human endeavors are a bad dream (9-10), in contrast to being wide awake in God's presence (11-12). Praise the Lord!

Fri Luke 9:57-62 Sometimes converts (raw recruits?) aren't entirely convinced about Jesus and are not yet committed to a new start in life. Perhaps dedication to Jesus will mean giving up comforts (58), or it may mean cutting ties with the dead past (59-60), or even saying goodbye to those we have loved

(61-62). We are crossing our own Samaria, too, as we follow Jesus.

Sat Acts 20:17-27 It has happened in our generation, that our overseas missionaries are not permitted to stay close to their dear friends, even though they have *served the Lord Jesus with all humility* as God's messengers (17-21). We trust God to take care of their personal safety (22-24) as they return home (25), and we will bank on the Lord supporting His children by the *whole counsel of God*, which they received from the traveling missionary.

Such events are heart-breaking; we take comfort in knowing that we will meet again at Jesus' feet. Lord Jesus, come quickly to our rescue! Amen.
