

New Testament Letter1 Corinthians 9:16-23 (NIV84)

¹⁶Yet when I preach the gospel, I cannot boast, for I am compelled to preach. Woe to me if I do not preach the gospel! ¹⁷ If I preach voluntarily, I have a reward; if not voluntarily, I am simply discharging the trust committed to me. ¹⁸ What then is my reward? Just this: that in preaching the gospel I may offer it free of charge, and so not make full use of my rights in preaching it.

¹⁹Though I am free and belong to no man, I make myself a slave to everyone, to win as many as possible. ²⁰To the Jews I became like a Jew, to win the Jews. To those under the law I became like one under the law (though I myself am not under the law), so as to win those under the law. ²¹To those not having the law I became like one not having the law (though I am not free from God's law but am under Christ's law), so as to win those not having the law. ²²To the weak I became weak, to win the weak. I have become all things to all men so

that by all possible means I might save some. ²³I do all this for the sake of the gospel, that I may share in its blessings.

Sermon......Mark 1:29-39 (NIV84)

²⁹ As soon as they left the synagogue, they went with James and John to the home of Simon and Andrew. ³⁰ Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told Jesus about her. ³¹ So he went to her, took her hand and helped her up. The fever left her and she began to wait on them.

³² That evening after sunset the people brought to Jesus all the sick and demon-possessed. ³³ The whole town gathered at the door, ³⁴ and Jesus healed many who had various diseases. He also drove out many demons, but he would not let the demons speak because they knew who he was.

³⁵ Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed. ³⁶ Simon and his companions went to look for him, ³⁷ and when they found him, they exclaimed: "Everyone is looking for you!"

³⁸ Jesus replied, "Let us go somewhere else—to the nearby villages—so I can preach there also. That is why I have come." ³⁹ So he traveled throughout Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and driving out demons.

Highlights from the January 31, 2021 Quarterly Voters' Meeting

The meeting began with a devotion and prayer. There were 56 voters present, with 8 participating remotely. For the various reports you may view/download the voter supplementary material by accessing this folder online: tinyurl.com/ v-1-31-rpts. <> Elders/Membership: Jack Mielke applied for voting membership. Soul care for Sarah Joos was discussed; the Elders will bring a motion for action at the February 21 meeting. Motions carried to accept Dwight and Caleb Gantt by transfer Zion, Longville, GA into communicant membership, and Caleb Heinze by transfer from Gethsemane, Spokane, WA. Rhiannon Roehl was transferred to Berea, Inver Grove Heights, MN by the Church Council. A motion carried to terminate the membership of Melissa née Otte (Parker) Owen because we are unable to her. Motions carried to terminate the memberships of Maggie Caird, Blakely Nyhus, and Rayne Reetz, each at the member's request. A motion carried to terminate the membership of Lindsey née Matysik Johnson according to bylaw 2.08c, since she will not respond to our extensive efforts to serve her. The Elders announced that the following may be removed from our membership at the Feb. 23 meeting, since they will not respond to our extensive efforts to serve them. Chong Vang, Ger Vang, and Mai Ka Vang. <> Pastors' report: The congregation's 2020 Annual Report should be coming out this week. During 2020 there were 11 baptisms, 11 confirmations, 2 adult confirmations, 2 weddings, and 8 victory services. We are constantly bringing the Word of God in public worship, Bible classes, confirmation and other instruction classes, pastoral counseling, and various visits, even with the changes brought about by COVID-19. The pastors want our members to know that they're never too busy to serve the members with the Word of God. <> **Deacons:** We will hold midweek Lenten services at 6:30 pm only, which will also be live-streamed (because we're having school in the sanctuary on weekdays). A motion carried to hold Easter services at 6:30 pm Saturday, 9:00 and 11:00 am Sunday (all will be the same service, and the 9:00 service will be live-streamed). <> Education and Principal: We are waiting on more building information before making summer VBS plans. All basketball teams have been practicing; girls' games are on the schedule. The grade school basketball tournament is cancelled. Rug runners have been ordered and will be installed. Motions carried to release Paul Tiefel III and Carrie Reim from their calls, effective at the end of this school year. Morgan Lone is now the only school secretary. We have conducted mandatory safety drills in school and mandatory reporting training for new staff. We have updated web monitoring software policy. One new student has been enrolled in Kindergarten. Mrs. Reim is taking some time off this semester (long

weekends) to care for her ailing mother. <> Property: We are continuing with monthly workdays. Siding the shed is complete; shingling will take place in the spring. We will need additional cleaners during Lent, for after midweek services. Contact lerry LeDuc if you are able to help. <> Teacher calls: An initial slate of candidates was provided by the CLC President for our vacant positions in the lower grades and upper grades. Additional nominations were added from the floor. The voters resolved to call Mrs. June Schmid for the lower grades (1-2 for 2021-22), and Caleb Noeldner for upper grades (5-6 for 2021-22). Caleb Noeldner is currently in the Milwaukee area, teaching grade 5 in a public school. <> Finances: Summary of 2020 - We received about \$713K, and spent about \$693K. Both were less than budget of \$736K. Contributions were up about \$9,500 compared to 2019. The budget already set for 2021 is \$778K. Our synod offerings (CBP) came in just short of \$190K in 2020. Total receipts about \$1.2M, about 7% over 2019. Indebtedness is down about 5% to \$959K. A motion carried to set the 2021 CBP amount at \$200K, as recommended by the Church Council. <> Building Project: Final design refinements of the site and building plan were presented by the Building Committee. Material costs have risen as a result of COVID-19. The committee plans to come to the February voters' meeting with refined estimates, and for a decision from the voters on whether or not to move forward with construction this summer. The cost of the plan as presented would be in the area of \$1.8M, rather than the previous estimate of \$1.7M. The Building Finance and Publicity Committee presented a budget impact report. The impact of the increased debt service would mean adding an initial \$61K per year to the budget (an increase of 7.8% over current). This increase will be less if we exceed our initial goals for contributions to the building fund, and could also be decreased somewhat if we receive lowinterest personal loans from our members. Our members are encouraged to make use of our Scrip program, which can also substantially offset these increases. <> Outreach Committee: Work is being done on booth designs for Northern WI State Fair. Pre-K & K roundups have been cancelled for this year. We are planning for evangelism "webinar" in the spring. Other projects: promoting online services with a banner, producing a DVD of hymns for nursing homes, providing members with "blessing bags," with personal items and outreach materials for the homeless and needy, production of short devotional videos for social media. Help from our members is always needed. <> Other: Our outgoing President, James Sydow, read his report which will appear in the 2020 Yearbook. The Messiah ILHS Student Grant Fund Committee reports that we fell behind at the end of 2020 in meeting our needs to support families sending their students to ILC. We will receive applications for next year in March. <> A Special voter's meeting has been scheduled for Sunday, February 21 at 6:30 pm, to discuss membership matters, teacher calls (if necessary), and to make a decision concerning the building project. <> **The meeting was adjourned** at 8:42 pm with prayer for the Holy Spirit's guidance for filling our teacher vacancies, the Lord's Prayer, and the Benediction.

Outreach Blessing Bags: The outreach committee is in the beginning stages of a new project called Blessing Bags. We will be putting together care packages for members to keep in their car to be able to hand out to the homeless, or others they see in need. They will have food, supplies, uplifting passages, and in invitation to meet with one of our pastors. At this stage we are asking for donations of the following: Travel size toiletries, hand warmers, mini water bottles, non-perishable ready to eat snacks granola bars, crackers, cookies, etc. We will also be accepting monetary donations to purchase supplies. Why Build?

On February 21st, the Voters will decide whether we should proceed with the proposed building project. This is the second of four inserts to explain how this building project will meet the needs of our growing school and church. A project of this size (\$1.7 million) will need the support of the whole congregation.

Part II: A Re-worked Office Area


Last week we reviewed how the new building project has plans for 10 classrooms, each able to hold 25 students for an enrollment of 250. Growth along the way from our 150 average of the past few years to 250 will require adding teachers. We are presently 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaching positions away from having one teacher per classroom. But adding teachers and students will mean needed additions in office personnel.


The Planning Committee passed on to the Building Committee the need for more rooms for secretaries, pastors, principal, and small groups. The proposed plan addresses all these needs and creates new space while freeing up old space so that the new floorplan will have these rooms.


- Principal's office
- Sick room
- Double the school secretary space
- Triple the workroom for school and church
- Three offices for the three pastors
- New church secretary reception room to house also the church library
- A modern special meeting room for school/church use

In addition the old library (along with the present workroom and school, office and principal's office) will be converted to make a large classroom. The new library will be slightly larger. The old blue room will be freed up for a small meeting room.

The floorplan also adds two large bathrooms for students and a modest staff bathroom. Overall, the new space should provide a great workshop for teaching the lambs of the Savior well into the future with important benefits right away.







Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; Feb. 8-13, '21

Mon Job 7:1-7 A quick read of the whole book gives the strong impression that Job was a type of Jesus: God allowed Satan to afflict him so severely that he could not relax (1-3), his fragility depressed him (4-5), his life was drawing to a close all two soon (6-7), and his friends failed to understand what he was going through. Indeed, *God does great things which we cannot comprehend* (37:5), so the child of God casts himself upon the Lord's mercy, convinced that God's thoughts and ways are higher than ours (Romans 11:33-36).

Tues Mark 1:29-39 Jesus was constantly pressured by folks who craved His help (29-30); He did not disappoint them, even though he lost some hours of sleep (32-35) and attending to for His own needs (35). After all, soul-care deserved higher priority than medical care, and even demons couldn't stand in His way (38-39), for He came to seek and to save those who were lost.

Wed 1 Corinthians 9:16-23 Jesus had claimed the Apostle Paul as His spokes-man, and that privilege made Paul not only willing and self-sacrificing in Jesus' service (16-19), but he even put himself "into the shoes" of Jews and non-Jews when he presented the gospel. He understood people; he reached out to people; he loved people; he wanted to see them in heaven.

Thurs Psalm 103 For what good reasons do we praise the LORD? Mostly that He *forgives all our iniquities* (3), then that His positives are greater than all our negatives (6-13). He pities us for what we are – mortal and fragile (14-16) --while He is divinely eternal, compassionate, and superior (17-19). God's angels and all His trophies adore Him, and so do we (20-22).

Fri Mark 6:30-44 Jesus joined His disciples for a few hours of rest (30-32), for they were all human. Next, when they were mobbed by folks desperate for divine help, we are told that Jesus was moved with compassion for them because they were like sheep not having a shepherd. Surely, Jesus was moved with divine compassion to teach them many things for their spiritual welfare, while His human compassion prompted Him to fill their stomachs (37-44).

Sat Acts 21:1-14 As the Apostle Paul hop-scotched along the coast, he by-passed Cyprus, made a brief stop-over at Tyre, and left friends in tears that they would not see each other again. But why was he in such a rush? Because he wanted to get to Jerusalem by Pentecost, the festival when Jews from all over the world would trek to Jerusalem for worship, and Paul could use that opportunity to proclaim God's love for them, explaining that Jesus had loved them enough to clear them with God via His self-sacrifice.

Apparently, there was no time to waste! Stay tuned.
