Weekend Scripture Reading Series: The Account of Jesus' Suffering and Death according to Luke

³² There were also two others, criminals, led with Him to be put to death. ³³ And when they had come to the place called Calvary, there they crucified Him, and the criminals, one on the right hand and the other on the left. ³⁴ Then lesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do." And they divided His garments and cast lots.³⁵ And the people stood looking on. But even the rulers with them sneered, saying, "He saved others; let Him save Himself if He is the Christ, the chosen of God." ³⁶ The soldiers also mocked Him, coming and offering Him sour wine, ³⁷ and saying, "If You are the King of the Jews, save Yourself." ³⁸ And an inscription also was written over Him in letters of Greek, Latin, and Hebrew: THIS IS THE KING OF THE JEWS. ³⁹ Then one of the criminals who were hanged blasphemed Him, saying, "If You are the Christ, save Yourself and us." ⁴⁰ But the other, answering, rebuked him, saying, "Do you not even fear God, seeing you are under the same condemnation? ⁴¹ "And we indeed justly. for we receive the due reward of our deeds: but this Man has

done nothing wrong." ⁴² Then he said to Jesus, "Lord, remember me when You come into Your kingdom." ⁴³ And Jesus said to him, "Assuredly, I say to you, today you will be with Me in Paradise."

Response of the Congregation, in Song:

⁴⁴ Now it was about the sixth hour, and there was darkness over all the earth until the ninth hour. ⁴⁵ Then the sun was darkened, and the veil of the temple was torn in two.⁴⁶ And when Jesus had cried out with a loud voice, He said, "Father, into Your hands I commit My spirit." Having said this, He breathed His last. ⁴⁷ So when the centurion saw what had happened, he glorified God, saying, "Certainly this was a righteous Man!" 48 And the whole crowd who came together to that sight, seeing what had been done, beat their breasts and returned.⁴⁹ But all His acquaintances, and the women who followed Him from Galilee, stood at a distance, watching these things. ⁵⁰ Now behold, there was a man named Joseph, a council member, a good and just man. ⁵¹ He had not consented to their decision and deed. He was from Arimathea, a city of the Jews, who himself was also waiting for the kingdom of God. 52 This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. ⁵³ Then he took it down, wrapped it in linen, and laid it in a tomb that was hewn out of the rock, where no one had ever lain before.⁵⁴ That day was the Preparation, and the Sabbath drew near. ⁵⁵ And the women who had come with Him from Galilee followed after, and they observed the tomb and how His body was laid. 56 Then they returned and prepared spices and fragrant oils. And they rested on the Sabbath according to the commandment.

Sermon Text.....Philippians 2:5-11

⁵ Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus, ⁶ who, being in the form of God, did not consider it robbery to be equal with God, ⁷ but made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bondservant, and coming in the likeness of men. ⁸ And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to the point of death, even the death of the cross. ⁹ Therefore God also has highly exalted Him and given Him the name which is above every name, ¹⁰ that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, ¹¹ and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

The Night in which He was betrayed: These words are familiar to any communicant. They set the context for the first Lord's Supper – and every celebration since. The Lord's Supper is a powerful reminder that the body of Jesus is really present with the bread and the blood of Jesus is really present with the wine and are given by the Savior to assure the communicant of the forgiveness of all sins. It is also an opportunity for the communicant to "proclaim the Lord's death till He comes." In reality, the communicant is preaching a sermon about the birth, life, death, Resurrection and impending return of Jesus.

These are some of the truths which form part of the selfexamination of which the Spirit speaks. (1 Corinthians 11) Once a year we have the opportunity to receive Sacrament on the very day of its institution – this week at the Maundy Thursday service at 6:30 pm.

The Greatest Vaccine Ever! A brochure describing the vaccine for COVID claimed that one benefit was that it was "93% effective at preventing hospitalization and 100% effective at preventing death." "100% effective at preventing death"? That is an interesting phrase. Obviously the context indicates that it is talking about 100% effective at preventing death from COVID, still quite a claim. But what if there was a vaccine that actually could prevent death from anything and everything? That would be the greatest discovery in the history of the world.

And yet that is exactly what is happening this week in history. On Palm Sunday Jesus starts the final path to the cross on Good Friday where He will by His death destroy the power of death that the devil held over us (Heb. 2:14-15). He will taste death for every sinner (Heb. 2:9). He will abolish death and bring life and immortality to light through the Gospel (2 Tim. 1:10). No amount of human effort could accomplish what Jesus will get done on Good Friday. That is the gift of love that God has given to the world.

He's risen, He's risen, Christ Jesus, the Lord; He opened Death's prison, the Incarnate Word. Break forth, hosts of heaven, in jubilant song, And, earth, sea, and mountain, the paean prolong. Oh, where is thy sting, Death? We fear thee no more; Christ rose, and now open is fair Eden's door. For all our transgressions His blood does atone; Redeemed and forgiven, we now are His own. Amen. We have completed our first goal by surpassing 25% of the total project cost of \$1.8 million. The next steps for the support of our project include many opportunities to help:

News from our Overseas Missionary Peter Evensen: I just wanted to let you know that I was diagnosed with malaria (type plasmodium falciparum) today. I went in Tuesday because I've had a cough for several weeks and an irritated throat and mild headaches and possibly mild night sweats along with some other body pains. The doctor put me on some antibiotics and medicine to help me sleep while we did a blood work, including a malaria test. Everything came back fine except I was positive for malaria with 480 p/µL, which the doctor said was a rather high concentration, but he figured it was due to the fact I didn't grow up here and develop a natural tolerance for it. I don't know what level he usually sees, but I almost feel like I should feel sicker than I do, so thanks be to God!

I am on a 3-day course of an anti-malarial combination drug and a 3-day course of anti-worm medication (perhaps that also helps with the malaria parasite).

A year and a half ago I had some similar symptoms and the doctor thought it might be malaria, which alarmed me then. But having been here as long as I have and talking to more and more natives, they consider malaria to be no worse than the cold or flu, so at this point I'm not really worried. The doctor didn't even schedule me for a follow up test after I finish the course of medication, which did surprise me. That either indicates his strong confidence in the medication or that he doesn't view plasmodium falciparum to be as deadly as Wikipedia. He did say, however, to come back in problems persist.

I would appreciate your prayers, however, as I try to rest and recover over the next few days and I will try to keep you informed of major changes. Palm Sunday's STONES

Some of the Pharisees called to Him from the crowd, "Teacher, rebuke Your disciples." But He answered and said to them, "I tell you that if



these should keep silent, the stones would immediately cry out." Luke 19:39-40

As Jesus rode into Jerusalem, huge crowds chanted praises: "'Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the LORD!' Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!" This was galling to Jesus' enemies, who called upon Him to reject the kind of praise that only belongs to the LORD's Christ.

Instead Jesus accepted their hosannas. He wanted to hear such praise from them, for He truly was the LORD's Christ. Nothing in all creation could take away from that truth; in fact, if the people refused to sing His praises, the stones themselves would be compelled to cry out!

What if it had actually happened? What if the people had fallen silent and the very rocks had begun to chant praises to the Christ? What a miracle that would have been! And yet, it is no less a miracle that the Holy Spirit has overcome our own stony hearts of unbelief, so that we sing the praises of the Lord Jesus, knowing who He really is. This very thing was prophesied in the Old Testament:

"I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit within you; I will take the heart of stone out of your flesh and give you a heart of flesh." Ezekiel 36:26

If it were up to us, we would have been no better than the crowds who only saw in Jesus an earthly political hero. Many of them even called for His crucifixion a few days later. Worse yet, we could very well have been among the jealous scribes and Pharisees who considered Jesus to be a fraud, and a threat to their own agenda. The Bible itself describes our own sinful nature as being dead in trespasses and blind to God's truth. What we have on the inside is, by nature, an unbelieving heart of stone. But in His mercy God gave His powerful Word, "like a hammer that breaks the rock in pieces" (Jeremiah 23:29), to demolish our pride. Through His Spirit He leads us to repentance for sin, and to faith in His Son as our Redeemer. In this way He has turned our stony hearts into hearts of flesh that are living because Christ now lives in us.


Can stones really speak? On that first Palm Sunday, if Jesus had willed it, the very stones could have cried out in praise of their Creator and the Redeemer of the world. Today, let us joyfully resolve that we shall not be silent as stones. After all, we have the best reason to sing the praises of the One who rode into Jerusalem to die in our place.



II. A New Place to Worship

I Kings 8:54-58: And so it was, when Solomon had finished praying all this prayer and supplication to the LORD, that he arose from before the altar of the LORD, from kneeling on his knees with his hands spread up to heaven. Then he stood and blessed all the assembly of Israel with a loud voice, saying: "Blessed be the LORD, who has given rest to His people Israel, according to all that He promised. There has not failed one word of all His good promise, which He promised through His servant Moses. May the LORD our God be with us, as He was with our fathers. May He not leave us nor forsake us, that He may incline our hearts to Himself, all His ways, and to to walk in keep His commandments and His statutes and His judgments, which He commanded our fathers.

The building of the temple in Solomon's reign was a tremendous undertaking. Indeed, the sheer scale of the task must have been daunting. The project took 30,000 laborers, 150,000 stonemasons and haulers, and 3,300 supervisors seven years to complete. Furthermore, no expense was spared in this endeavor. The temple was built with the most costly and precious materials, including cedar, gold, olive wood, cypress, and bronze. This structure would have been spectacular to behold, and once it was completed Solomon may have been tempted to step back with pride in himself and his people in completing such a momentous building project. However, both in his prayer of dedication and his blessing of the assembly, Solomon rightly views the completion of the temple as a visible reminder of God's greatness and faithfulness. The temple itself, then, was not a symbol of human greatness but of God's unfailing love in keeping His promises.

Messiah's initial building project was on a much humbler scale. The congregation was founded out of concern for faithfulness to God's Word – their greatest challenge – but because they prioritized the spiritual over the earthly, they were faced with a very practical problem: they had no church building. This "problem," though, soon proved, like Solomon's building project, God's faithfulness, and care. The group continued to worship in the Erle Boldon home until January 1961 when they rented a church on Western Avenue for their worship services. By April of that same year, a fund was established to build a church in Eau Claire, and later that month, the voters resolved to purchase property near the corner of LaSalle St. and N. Hastings Way, the location of the current church and teacherage, for \$3,800. During the fall of 1961, the building committee, under the leadership of Leonard Eckel, was hard at work trying to develop a plan to build a church on the LaSalle Street property. They soon discovered, however, that the cost to build a conventional building sufficient to meet the group's needs was beyond the means of the congregation. But their prayers were answered when the Lord introduced them to an architect from the Spencer Corporation, who was able to build a church for \$30,000, which fell within the budget of the congregation. Ground was broken on November 5, 1961, and construction began in late February. On Easter Sunday, April 22, 1962, the first worship service was held in the new church, with 94 people in attendance. The church was dedicated on June 17, 1962, with Pastor George Tiefel speaking at the morning service and Pastor George Barthels at the afternoon service. Words taken from the dedication bulletin emphasize where the credit for this building project should go: "The Lord has done great things for us . . . TO HIM ALONE BE GLORY."

Though Solomon's temple was far more magnificent than the sanctuary our original members constructed, we can see the LORDS's hand in both building projects. Once the LORD decreed that Solomon would build the temple, He did not spare any time or expense in completing it. Similarly, though the members of Messiah were not blessed with Solomon's riches, they likewise dedicated time and money to building a worship site. Like Solomon, they needed to complete what must have seemed like a very daunting project, but with much more limited means. They, too, were rewarded by the LORD's power in overcoming earthly challenges and His faithfulness in keeping His promises to provide for His children. The result was also similar: a building that is a reminder of God's faithfulness. As noted in the quote above from the dedication bulletin, the congregation, like Solomon, recognized the church building not as a testament to their own greatness and ingenuity but as tangible proof of God's glory and what great things He has done for us. During this anniversary year, let us too recognize that any physical blessings we have are proof of God's greatness and His continuing grace.

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; March 29-April 3, '21.

Mon Zechariah 9:9-10 A good reason for keeping our minds and hearts open to God's Word in the <u>Old</u> Testament is to discover and digest how God kept His people attuned to the <u>New</u> Testament. This passage proves our point, as do many of the Psalms. **Psalm 72,** for example, lays out Jesus' career—to save for all time, generously, over the entire planet, for all sorts of humans in all their needs, compelling their devotion to Him for all their blessings.

Blessed be the LORD, our God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit!

Tues Mark 11:1-10 Approaching Jerusalem from the east, they walked uphill in a gentle climb, taking breathers at Bethphage and Bethany. Not to make things easier for Him but to fulfill ancient prophecy, Jesus rode a juvenile donkey into the city, where devout people welcomed His arrival. [We expect to meet them again in heaven.] Less than a week later, others scoffed at Him and rejoiced at His departure on the cross. [We don't expect to see them again.]

Wed Philippians 2:5-11 The mind/attitude of Jesus amazes us—that He gave up so much for us in order to give us much more than we deserve. He left behind His lofty home and demoted Himself as low as anyone can get (7-8). For what purpose? In order to pay off our debt with His own precious blood, laid down on the sacrificial cross of Calvary. [Now change channels] Because Jesus paid the last iota, He earned reinstatement on Easter (9) and thus merits everyone's devout adoration – now and forever (10-11).

Thurs Exodus 12 The good reason for the Jewish sacred calendar beginning with Passover is that Passover marked the beginning of their new life under God's jurisdiction. Passover means just what it declares: the avenging angel would **pass over** those homes where occupants took God as His word and accommodated themselves to His directions. Read the entire chapter to see that they followed God's directives specifically, devoutly, worshipfully.

Fri Psalm 22 Jesus cried out, "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me? Why **ME**? For what good reason are You turning Your back on <u>ME</u>, Your own beloved Son, when I'm down as low as I can get (6) and mocked as a failure (7-8)? I started out fresh (9-11), but now I'm close to death on this cross (14-18). Nonetheless, I am still relying on You to help Me (19-21), for which I will praise You both at home and abroad, now and forever (22-31)."

Sat Hebrews 4:14-16, 15:7-9 Jesus left Earth behind, but that does not mean He has forgotten us. He understands what we are up against, sympathizes with us, loves us, and is still serving our best interests. He invites us to keep connected, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need.
