So they went. ⁵Again he went out about the sixth and the ninth hour, and did likewise. ⁶ And about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing idle, and said to them, 'Why have you been standing here idle all day?' ⁷They said to him, 'Because no one hired us.' Did you not agree with me for a denarius? ¹⁴ Take what is yours and go your way. I wish to give to this last man the same as to you. ¹⁵ Is it not lawful for me to do what I wish with my own things? Or is your eye evil because I am good?' 16 So the last will be first, and the first last. For many are called, but few chosen."

Epistle Reading.....1 Corinthians 9:24-10:5

²⁴ Do you not know that those who run in a race all run, but one receives the prize? Run in such a way that you may obtain it. ²⁵ And everyone who competes for the prize is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a perishable crown, but we for an imperishable crown. ²⁶ Therefore I run thus: not with uncertainty. Thus I fight: not as one who beats the air. ²⁷ But I discipline my body and bring it into subjection, lest, when I have preached to others, I myself should become disqualified. ^{10:1} Moreover, brethren, I do not want you to be unaware that all our fathers were under the cloud, all passed through the sea, ² all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, ³ all ate the same spiritual food, ⁴ and all drank the same spiritual drink. They are almost ready to stone me!" ⁵ And the LORD said to Moses, "Go on before the people, and take with you some of the elders of Israel. Also take in your hand your rod with which you struck the river, and go. ⁶Behold, I will stand before you there on the rock in Horeb; and you shall strike the rock, and water will come out of it, that the people may drink." Highlights from the May 2, 2021 Quarterly Voters' Meeting: The meeting began with a devotion and prayer. Various boards, committees, and the pastors gave reports to the voters as outlined Packet." the "Voter which at in can be reviewed tinyurl.com/vpacket-05-02. **Elders/membership:** <> Nathan Rodebaugh was received into membership by transfer from Messiah. Hales Corners. WI. The Elders continue to serve our members on individual soul-care issues, and are outlining a plan to promote in-person fellowship once pandemic restrictions are lifted. <> Pastors' report: Our Lenten series was well received. 15 of our young people will be confirmed on June 6. Seminary student Drew Naumann will be preaching May 15-16. About 20 individuals are receiving adult instruction classes. Hospital and shut-in visits are getting easier due to the easing of COVID restrictions. Concern was expressed for those who have become distant from the Word during COVID restrictions. <> Deacons: COVID safety measures have been eased somewhat for our services. Masks and social distancing are still required, per local ordinance. Sunday school and Bible class will be recessed during the summer due to the building project. Due to increased attendance and to maintain social distancing, we have added a 3rd service at 11:00 am for several upcoming weekends. Services are resuming at several healthcare facilities. We thank Kari Behlmer for her service as part-time church secretary. Amanda Roth will increase her hours to cover many of Kari's tasks. We are making definite plans for doing a new church photo directory. Photos will be taken July 7-10 at no cost to members. More details will be coming.

<> Board of Education and Principal: Summer sessions for VBS are July 12-16 and August 2-6 at ILC. We are planning for teacher/staff recognition after 8th grade graduation service on May 23 for Kâren Franson, Carrie Reim & Paul Tiefel III. We are working on transitioning school technology duties after Mr. Tiefel leaves. Summer projects include reviewing our non-member enrollment policy and planning for furnishing the new classrooms after building project. School will end one week earlier this year (May 21) to accommodate construction. Next year's school calendar will not be finalized until mid-July, when we have a more definite for completion of classrooms. The security camera at the main school entrance had to be replaced. The Board approved school fees for next year. <> **Board of Property:** (See the list of completed and ongoing projects in the Voter Packet). <> Messiah ILHS Student Grant Fund: We have 6 applications for next school year, and the committee will work on a budget for those in mid-May. We had \$12,900 budgeted for this year and are currently about \$2,300 short for commitments this year. <> Outreach: We provided Silent Sunday School packets for the "Here We Grow Again" consignment event. We are installing Little Church Libraries, and are searching for a Memorial Day parade coordinator. Upcoming projects include our annual booth for the Northern Wisconsin State Fair, promoting summer VBS sessions at ILC, a one-day outdoor VBS session at a public park, an Evangelism Webinar to be held on August 22, distributing "Blessing Bags," and an outdoor banner advertising our online services. <> Technology Committee: Matt Kelly reported that our wireless mic system, which is about 20 years old, needs replacement. The cost for 3 high-quality headset mics, 3 handheld mics, and wireless receivers is about \$3,500. A motion carried to spend up to \$3,500 from the Undesignated Memorial Fund to purchase the new equipment. <> Building Committee - Dan Sydow reported; the slide presentation can be viewed HERE. The committee continues to meet bi-weekly with the architect to work out final design details. Tom Beekman has been coordinating moving and putting together volunteer tasks for members. The estimated cost savings through volunteer labor is about \$80K. The contractors will soon mobilize onsite and grading will begin. After school ends on May 21, the school portion of the building will be emptied. A ground-breaking service will be held after worship on May 30, and Royal Construction begins onsite demolition and construction on June 1. The plan is to have a substantial portion of the new addition ready for the start of school in fall, with the rest (the last 4 classrooms and pastoral offices) to be completed during the fall semester. We plan to start the school year with older students in the sanctuary and fellowship hall as they have been this year. <> Building Publicity and Finance Committee: We have

\$200K in personal loan offers, with a number at 0% interest. Our CEF loan was approved for \$1.45M, but we will only need to borrow about \$1.2M. Every \$100K contributed saves us about \$5,500/year on mortgage payments. **<> Finances** [See the Voter Packet for the full report]: YTD receipts are \$173K, disbursements are \$185K, and the General Fund balance is about \$31K. Total receipts and disbursements are both up about \$7K over last year, but the budget is about \$14K over last year. Receipts for all funds are \$313K, and total disbursements are \$249K. Our total current debt is about \$950K.

<> The meeting was adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.

CLC Financial Report - April

General Fund – April offerings: \$62,808 vs disbursements: \$76,834, resulted in a net shortfall for the month of \$14,026, increasing the General Fund deficit to -\$55,517. Offerings to date are short of our CBP estimated revenue by \$107,181, but YTD disbursements are \$51,664 less than estimated expenses. All are aware of the need to support the General Fund which provides the major funding for the Boards of Missions, Trustees, Regents, & Ed Pub, and the Boards are aware of the importance of remaining under budget. But most importantly, the Lord is aware of our needs & always provides.

ILC Operations – April revenue: \$84,577 (incl \$49,500 subsidy) vs disbursements: \$106,985, but still maintaining a substantial balance for this last month of the school year & last 2 months of the fiscal year, ending June 30. YTD ILC disbursements are \$68,230 less than YTD budgeted expenses.

ILC Building Projects – April offerings: \$1,031 vs disbursements of \$8,757 for Planning Committee expenses. April earnings (Div/Int) were \$3,886 (YTD \$59,605). The Committee is bringing a recommendation for the June 24 CLC Convention for a new gym and repurposing the old gym.

CEF – April revenue: \$20,377 (\$375 offerings, \$20,002 CEF loan payments) vs disbursements: \$3,927. The Trustees have funded CEF loans to Immanuel-Mankato (\$69,000) for gym repairs & Grace-Sleepy Eye (\$132,750), for a teacherage. Recently, they approved loan applications from Messiah, Eau Claire (\$1.45 million limit) for a new school addition, & Prince of Peace, Loveland (\$130,000 limit) for expansion of its church facility. Several others have inquired about CEF loans.

MDF – **April** offerings: \$6,436 vs disbursements: \$14,012, which includes \$10,000 for the 10th construction grant (of 12 planned) for the Nepal Bible Institute classroom building and quarters.

SAF – April receipts: \$18,772 (\$16,091 SAF loan payments) vs disbursements: \$7,274 for student loans & grants. <u>SAF Endowment Account</u> earnings (Div/Int) of \$35,938 for 10 mo YTD on a portfolio balance of \$1,512,340. Capital appreciation of the portfolio for April was \$55,386.

ILC PMPG – Public Ministry Prep Grants: YTD earnings: \$44,174 vs grants: \$32,400 to 9 teacher & 6 pastor students this school year. The PMP Endowment portfolio had a capital appreciation of \$68,079 for a current value of \$1,858,933. (Note: Since capital gains can fluctuate (+or-) each month, those portfolio gains & balances will be reported periodically & separately from the actual earnings reported each month,)

Kinship – Sponsors/Offerings: \$12,566 vs disbursements: \$490 (Admin, Nigeria Sem students).

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; May 17-22, '21

Mon Acts 1:13-26 Judas had been lost from the select group of apostles (which Peter had been pondering for over a month) so after a short rehearsal of the career of Judas Iscariot and pertinent Scriptures (15-21), he presented a motion for filling the empty position (13-22). Two nominees had the right qualifications, so they put the matter before Jesus to choose (by the process of voting) between the two, and from heaven Jesus selected Matthias.

Tues John 17:6-19 We are eaves-dropping on Jesus while He was begging His Father to fill other gaps when He left—gaps that would be mended by bonding His disciples to His Word (6-8) and God's saving Name (11-12). They could survive among hostiles in enemy territory (13-16), fortified and armored with God's reliable Word (17) when they graduated (18-19).

Wed 1 John 4:13-21 God knows every dirty corner of our mind, every stinky centimeter of our character, every crooked streak of our life. Understanding what we are, God still loves us anyway—loves us enough to bear our sins on His own shoulders, reach down and pull us free of Satan's grip, cuddle and kiss us. We are not afraid of God (17-18), for we know He loves us!

Thurs Psalm 8 God is great as Creator and Preserver of the Universe (1,3), also entrusting us humans with the care for Earth's living creatures (6-8). "*How Great Thou Art*" (a familiar gospel song) in stanza three gives the best reason for lifting our voices in soaring praise to our great God. "*That on the cross my burden gladly sharing He bled and died to take away my sin. Then sings my soul, my savior God, to Thee, 'How great Thou art!'"*

Fri Acts 1:9-11 Jesus' Ascension is put into the record with a dozen words—in contrast to the longer focus on those He left behind. Why this contrast? Because disciples need to focus on the assignments given them on Earth during their time of grace, to prepare themselves and others for Jesus' return, which we should not only patiently await, but eagerly anticipate.

Sat Acts 26:1-11 Finally a day in court—even if it was only a pretrial hearing! Paul stepped up to the mic, gestured for attention, and set the record straight—that a) his Jewish background was impeccable, b) his religion was founded on God's promises of the Resurrection (4-8), and c) Jesus did not fit into either a) or b). In fact, Paul was committed to the belief that Jesus was an impostor and that His followers should be eradicated—so he intimidated them, tortured them until they cursed Jesus, and chased them down when they fled and sought refuge in foreign lands. He had gone totally berserk! Then Jesus stopped him in his tracks.
