Old Testament Reading Exodus 16:2-9, 13-15

²Then the whole congregation of the children of Israel complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness, ³ And the children of Israel said to them, "Oh, that we had died by the hand of the LORD in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the pots of meat and when we ate bread to the full! For you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." ⁴Then the LORD said to Moses, "Behold, I will rain bread from heaven for you. And the people shall go out and gather a certain quota every day, that I may test them, whether they will walk in My law or not. 5 And it shall be on the sixth day that they shall prepare what they bring in, and it shall be twice as much as they gather daily." ⁶ Then Moses and Aaron said to all the children of Israel, "At evening you shall know that the LORD has brought you out of the land of Egypt. ⁷And in the morning you shall see the glory of the LORD; for He hears your complaints against the LORD. But what are we, that you complain against us?" 8 Also Moses said, "This shall be seen when the LORD gives you meat to eat in the evening, and in the morning bread to the full; for the LORD hears your complaints which you make against Him. And what are we? Your complaints are not against us but against the LORD." ⁹ Then Moses spoke to Aaron, "Say to all the congregation of the children of Israel, 'Come near before the LORD, for He has heard your complaints.' " " 13 So it was that quail came up at evening and covered the camp, and in the morning the dew lay all around the camp. ¹⁴And when the layer of dew lifted, there, on the surface of the wilderness, was a small round substance, as fine as frost on the ground. ¹⁵ So when the children of Israel saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" For they did not know what it was. And Moses said to them. "This is the bread which the LORD has given you to eat.

Gospel Reading......John 6:24-35

²⁴ when the people therefore saw that Jesus was not there, nor His disciples. they also got into boats and came to Capernaum, seeking Jesus. ²⁵ And when they found Him on the other side of the sea, they said to Him, "Rabbi, when did You come here?" ²⁶ Jesus answered them and said, "Most assuredly, I say to you, you seek Me, not because you saw the signs, but because you ate of the loaves and were filled. ²⁷ Do not labor for the food which perishes, but for the food which endures to everlasting life, which the Son of Man will give you, because God the Father has set His seal on Him." ²⁸ Then they said to Him. "What shall we do, that we may work the works of God?" ²⁹ Jesus answered and said to them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in Him whom He sent." ³⁰ Therefore they said to Him, "What sign will You perform then, that we may see it and believe You? What work will You do? 31 Our fathers ate the manna in the desert; as it is written, 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.' " 32 Then Jesus said to them, "Most assuredly, I say to you, Moses did not give you the bread from heaven, but My Father gives you the true bread from heaven. ³³ For the bread of God is He who comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." 34 Then they said to Him, "Lord, give us this bread always." ³⁵ And Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. He who comes to Me shall never hunger, and he who believes in Me shall never thirst.

Sermon Ephesians 4:17-24

¹⁷ This I say, therefore, and testify in the Lord, that you should no longer walk as the rest of the Gentiles walk, in the futility of their mind, 18 having their understanding darkened, being alienated from the life of God, because of the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart; ¹⁹ who, being past feeling, have given themselves over to lewdness, to work all uncleanness with greediness. ²⁰ But you have not so learned Christ, ²¹ if indeed you have heard Him and have been taught by Him, as the truth is in Jesus: ²² that you put off, concerning your former conduct, the old man which grows corrupt according to the deceitful lusts, ²³ and be renewed in the spirit of your mind, ²⁴ and that you put on the new man which was created according to God, in true righteousness and holiness.

Each year, a number of new students arrive at Immanuel Lutheran High School to live away from home for the first time. Messiah is once again organizing a way for these young people to experience a little "home





Immanuel Athletic Boosters -- Your chance to help! The IAB organization has been given the opportunity to fill positions for credential checking for the Blue Ox Music Festival in Eau Claire on Aug. 19-21. The money earned goes to the Immanuel Athletic Boosters which has provided over \$80,000 to support Immanuel High School athletics over the past 15 years. The Blue Ox Festival is a low key bluegrass, folk, Americana music event held just outside of Eau Claire on Crescent Avenue. Duties involve ensuring entering patrons have the proper event wristbands or credentials, and any items they bring into the grounds meet event criteria. These are passive compliance checks. Any concerns by patrons are handled by full-time employees of Blue Ox who are always on site and nearby. There are two shifts each day and you can choose to work one or both shifts on any or all of the days. If you work any one shift, you are allowed to stay on the grounds without charge for the entire day to enjoy the event. Continuing Under God's Grace A Reflection on the Past 60 Years VII. Messiah School – Simple Truth, Simple Faith, Simple Start

As I write this, I have open a report to the Messiah voters for the July 2021 Quarterly Meeting. Specifically, it is the report of the "Technology Committee." It reports of new "belt-clip microphones," "smart boards and projectors for classrooms," and "wall-mount camera upgrades." My, how far we've come since we met in a basement with a freezer for an altar!

In his tender farewell to pastor Timothy, the Apostle Paul writes, "I call to remembrance the genuine faith that is in you, which dwelt first in your grandmother Lois and our mother Eunice, and I am persuaded is in you also" (I Tim. 1:5). He understood how important the relationship is between Christian Education and parenting. That is good to think about in our day of sophisticated educational programs, and the use of amazing technology in modern schools—Messiah Lutheran School, no less than others.

As the early Messiah congregation grew, there was a strong desire to start a grade school for her numerous children. The relocation of Immanuel Lutheran College to Eau Claire seems to have been a catalyst for action. In January 1963, the CLC elected to buy the Ingram Estate for ILC. Not only would that draw a number of high school and college students to the area, but it would bring in several professors with their families. In July of that year, Messiah voted to open the doors of a Christian Day School; in the same meeting, Miss Shirley Wendland was called as the sole teacher. In September, school opened with 24 students.

To say "opened its doors" is mostly a figure of speech. The congregation barely had doors to open; the new sanctuary had just been dedicated in the summer of '62. For the first year, the "school" was set up every week in the back of the sanctuary and subsequently restored to church form for the weekend. In a recent interview, Miss Wendland recalls having no real blackboards, only a painted surface on a portable classroom divider. There was no copy machine; she had to hand copy textbook exercises onto that improvised blackboard. With students spread across eight grades, she recalls teaching some 23 classes per day.

And yet, the Lord provided, and provided in such a way that the educating got done and was done well. He provided the facilities, modest as they were; He provided the students, ready to learn of God's world and God's love; He provided a dedicated, resourceful, and godly faculty; He provided a congregation committed to the purpose of Christian Education and parents who lent a hand every step of the way—for instance, parents who helped with the never-ending task of grading papers, encouraged the called servants (pastors and teacher), and led their children to the undershepherds who, in turn, instructed them in the Good Shepherd's Word.


All was not book learning and classroom drudgery; Miss Wendland recalls numerous field trips: Sterling Pulp and Paper, Uniroyal, maple sap tapping and boiling, visiting a Millston cranberry bog. Perhaps ILC's second-hand church bus was used for some of those trips, as it was used daily as a school bus, driven by ILC profs, to collect Messiah School children that were scattered around the Eau Claire area (a recollection from Prof, Paul and Anne Koch).

It all sounds exhausting, this simple, sparse start of the school, but no doubt it was a labor of love, love inspired by Word-of-God-bound faith, faith that God is clear about what He wills for us, and clear that He will equip those whom He chooses to carry out what He wills to be done. That Messiah Lutheran School has continued these many years, and grown to what it is now, is an extraordinary work of His grace.

Education in our day can be complicated and sophisticated, and there are reasons why it must be if it is going to be relevant for our day. It is truly exciting to see the growth of our school building, the fine technology, and the many new, young faces who fill those classrooms as the new year begins. But let us remember that what is central and key to preparing our children for the world they will face is that we pass on "the genuine faith" of the generations of Christians in whose steps we follow.

Building Project Update

Member Help Needed: The Phase 1 portion of the Messiah Building Project is pushing rapidly to conclusion. Phase 1 opens sufficient portions of the existing school to allow school to start on September 7th. Part of Phase 1 requires that we re-install student lockers in the hallways. Almost all the lockers had to be removed from the building and stored outside to facilitate construction activities for Phase 1.

The Messiah Building Committee is scheduling a moving event on Saturday, August 14 at 10 AM to move the necessary lockers back into the school. The lockers come in combined units of 3-4 single lockers and require some muscling to get them loaded onto floor dollies, over thresholds, through doors, and then unloaded into place. We had 30 Immanuel High School students help us remove the lockers and they did a great job. It would be desirable to have at least 10-12 storm arm and strong back individuals to help with the reinstall effort.

Rapid Progress on Phase 1:

This past week saw sheetrock, taping, and texturing completed in all of the rooms and hallways needed for Phase 1 opening. Member volunteers came in on Friday August 6 and Saturday August 7 to paint all those areas and provide substantial project cost savings from those efforts. This week member volunteers will be putting ceramic tile on the new restroom walls, ceiling grid and tile in one of the classrooms in the old sanctuary, and insulation above the ceiling in the old sanctuary and portions of the new hallway. Additional significant project savings are occurring from these member volunteer efforts. A HUGE THANK YOU TO THOSE WHO HAVE DONATED THEIR TIME AND TALENTS TO THESE EFFORTS!

The Phase 1 floor areas not already tiled or carpeted will be ready for epoxy coating the following week. The epoxy floor requires several days to set before desks and other classroom furniture can be brought and should start on Monday August 15th.

Stay tuned to your bulletin and the weekly pastoral email for when that classroom moving event will occur and we start unpacking the boxes we spent many days packing this past spring.

The site work contractor is back putting in storm sewer hook ups to the new addition and preparing for installation of sidewalks, curb and gutter, and blacktop paving of the site. All of that work is scheduled to be completed before Labor Day and the start of school.

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; Aug. 9-14, '21

Mon Exodus 16:2-15 It's depressing: God's people not only accused Him of starving them, they went so far as to wish God had not spared them on Passover night (3). Moses&Aaron took it on the chin, while God took it on His heart (2-5). His test: "Follow My directions religiously to receive the exact amount of nutrition you need—as proof that IAM your considerate, loving, good-hearted God—more than you deserve." Praise the LORD!

Tues John 6:24-35 In cosmopolitan Capernaum Jesus handled similar people, Jews secularized by societal pressures and programmed to do it their way, not God's. They expected to please God via good behavior, whereas Jesus took it out of their hands entirely. "God **gives** you the true bread . . . and **gives** life to the world." [Note: Verse 35 is crucial to understanding vv. 51-56.]

Wed Ephesians 4:17-24 The *OLD MAN* = our human nature, spiritually hardhearted, ignorant, past feeling guilty, devoted to lust, filthy habits, and growing ever more corrupt in thought, word, and deed. Our *old man* stinks, and everything he touches stinks. So how can we survive? By learning *Christ*, by hearing and heeding Him, by stripping our *old man* naked—and then dressing ourselves in the outfit God has designed for us: the righteousness and true holiness of Jesus. Don't throw dirt on Jesus or His righteousness!!

Thurs Psalm 145 No dirt throwing here, but clean praise and pure adoration flowing from the converted heart (new man), extolling God's greatness, His wondrous works, awesome acts, and His righteousness (8-9, 14-17). Where do we mortals come into the picture? In the closing four stanzas, where we call upon Him for help as we revere and love Him. Indeed, we should revere, love, and trust in God above all else—first, last, and always. Amen!

Fri Ephesians 4:25-29 These verses may seem like over-kill, but from time to time we too need admonition to avoid cheating on others by lying/deceit (25) or harboring a grudge (26), for Satan is the father of such sinful urges (27). We are stealing from our employer when we slack off at work (28). Dirty language has gone viral; God has better use for our mouth/voice (29).

Sat Genesis 12:10-20 Abram's new man took a back seat to his old man in that he failed to trust God's protection during a famine in Canaan. He did not have God's permission to leave Canaan behind, but he went anyhow. That was a bad step which in turn led to other bad steps (11-13). How did God put a stop to the charade? To our surprise, He did so not by correcting Abram with His own voice from heaven, but by using a heathen to scold him in an earthly palace. That was enough to shame Abram for cheating on God, on his wife, and on his neighbor. Lord, have mercy on us for our foolishness!
