For waters shall burst forth in the wilderness, And streams in the desert. ⁷ The parched ground shall become a pool, And the thirsty land springs of water.

Epistle ReadingJames 1:17-27

¹⁷ Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and comes down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow of turning. ¹⁸ Of His own will He brought us forth by the word of truth, that we might be a kind of firstfruits of His creatures. ¹⁹ So then, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath; ²⁰ for the wrath of man does not produce the righteousness of God. ²¹Therefore lay aside all filthiness and overflow of wickedness, and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls. ²² But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves. ²³ For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man observing his natural face in a mirror; ²⁴ for he observes himself, goes away, and immediately forgets what kind of man he was. ²⁵ But he who looks into the perfect law of liberty and continues in it, and is not a forgetful hearer but a doer of the work, this one will be blessed in what he does. ²⁶ If anyone among you thinks he is religious, and does not bridle his tongue but deceives his own heart, this one's religion is useless. ²⁷ Pure and undefiled religion before God and the Father is this: to visit orphans and widows in their trouble, and to keep oneself unspotted from the world.

Sermon...... Mark 7:31-37

Again, departing from the region of Tyre and Sidon, He came through the midst of the region of Decapolis to the Sea of Galilee. ³² Then they brought to Him one who was deaf and had an impediment in his speech, and they begged Him to put His hand on him. ³³ And He took him aside from the multitude, and put His fingers in his ears, and He spat and touched his tongue. ³⁴ Then, looking up to heaven, He sighed, and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." ³⁵ Immediately his ears were opened, and the impediment of his tongue was loosed, and he spoke plainly. ³⁶ Then He commanded them that they should tell no one; but the more He commanded them, the more widely they proclaimed it. ³⁷ And they were astonished beyond measure, saying, "He has done all things well. He makes both the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."

Preaching Today: Pastor Bruce Naumann

- 1. A wretched man, both mute and deaf, Was brought to Jesus for relief; He came to know the Savior's pow'r, When he received a wondrous cure.



Continuing Under God's Grace A Reflection on the Past 60 Years VIII. Offsite Preaching Posts

For this is God, Our God forever and ever; He will be our guide Even to death (Psalm 48:14).

The typical Christian goes through two critical ages – very young and very old. Beginning with birth, a soul needs special care to be brought to Jesus. Parents, sponsors, Christians in the family and the whole congregation take great care to lay a solid foundation, built on Jesus and His work as Redeemer. We have covered earlier in our series the time and effort Messiah has invested in Christian education with our programs of Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, Christian Day School, and other aids for use at home. (See Part IV)

All of this is in accord with God's will: Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it (Proverbs 22:6). But the other critical age for a Christian is old age. The preacher gives this advice: Remember now your Creator in the days of your youth, before the difficult days come, and the years draw near when you say, "I have no pleasure in them" (Ecclesiastes 12:1).

The verses that follow describe the physical and mental breakdown that usually comes with old age. And often those years can have periods of loneliness as spouse, siblings and friends leave earth for heaven.

But just as Jesus singles out babies and young children as being especially important to Him (Matthew 18), so He has given special promises for the elderly. "Listen to Me, O house of Jacob, And all the remnant of the house of Israel, Who have been upheld by Me from birth, Who have been carried from the womb: Even to your old age, I am He, And even to gray hairs I will carry you! I have made, and I will bear; Even I will carry, and will deliver you (Isaiah 46:3-4). So, the ministry to the old and dying merits special attention and the Spirit of God has, over the years, blessed the efforts of Messiah to serve in this capacity.

Back in the late 1960's, weekly Sunday services were started at the County Home (now called Dove West), on Truax Avenue. Most of the preaching was done by professors and seminary students from Immanuel Lutheran College.

Although the name has changed and the old building has been replaced and then later remodeled, the message over the years has remained unchanged: Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today, and forever is the one Savior of all sinners. He has conquered death and freely gives eternal life to all who believe in Him.

When Dove West expanded and opened Dove South on Hwy 93, the management asked us to conduct weekly services there as well. A member of the staff told another care facility about our services, and we began to receive more requests. Sometimes members would be at a place, and we would go to serve. Other times members would ask where we were conducting services and then try to move there.

All this activity led the Elders/Deacons to form a sub-committee to evaluate the requests. Criteria were set up—Would we be serving any of our members? Does the facility have other churches coming in or would we be filling a gap? Do we have enough volunteers to go? Presently we are serving these places:

Lake Hallie Memory Care, Chippewa Falls, Wednesday 1:45 Our House Memory Care, Eau Claire, Wednesday 2:30 Dove Healthcare West, Eau Claire, Sunday 10:00 Heritage Assisted Living, Eau Claire, Sunday 10:15 Heritage Court, Eau Claire, Sunday 11:15 Dove Healthcare South, Eau Claire, Sunday 1:00 pm WI Veterans Home, Chippewa Falls, Sunday 2:00 pm

We have said "no" to some places because they were already being served by other groups. But all this activity has meant that we needed more preachers beyond ILC and its seminary students. Over 10 years ago Messiah began training laymen to preach and members to play hymns. Sermons can be provided. It has also helped that a member has coordinated the volunteers for preaching and playing music.

Today we have developed a list of preachers that includes retired pastors and professors in the area and a dozen laymen, in addition to active professors and seminary students. This group is assisted by a dozen musicians. Lawrence Bade is the coordinator. We need more volunteers so that the strain of preaching does not fall on a few and so that we can accept more inquiries. Ask Lawrence or one of the pastors how you can help in sharing the message about Jesus.

We are not in the business of numbers and visible results; instead, we are content to be able to scatter the Seed of God's Word. It is nonetheless remarkable to see what God is doing through this special ministry.

On a weekend, the total attendance at all the care facilities can number around 150; this is more than most of our CLC churches average. Attendance

was drastically affected by COVID. In fact, we had to stop going and could only offer a DVD service. But things are opening up again.

Over the years several individuals took classes, became members, and received a Christian funeral from Messiah. Family members of residents have been reached by our services. Residents who recovered enough to go home took with them appreciation for the Gospel – that our Savior Jesus Christ has abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel (II Timothy 1:10).

Certainly, that is a blessed truth that cheers the heart of every candidate for death, no matter their age. But think how precious it is to have that message when you are lonely, ailing, and facing death any moment!

What a special ministry God has given and grown at Messiah. We have Christian education for all, especially the young and especially the old. May God's Spirit continue to prosper both ages through the teaching of the Gospel. "O Death, where is your sting? O Hades, where is your victory?" The sting of death is sin, and the strength of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ (I Corinthians 15:55-57).

Mon Isaiah 35:1-7a is part of a larger unit; we already know other chapters of His-story. Idolaters are in for punishment (ch. 34), while God's people receive chastening to strengthen them (1-4) for their earthly pilgrimage.

God promised to invigorate ancient Israel for a new life (5-6) in a regenerated country (7)--which sounds much like a preview of heaven.

Tues Mark 7:31-37 In due time, Isaiah's prophecy came to pass, for God sent His Son down to our planet--providing visual and audible proof that God had not forsaken humanity (31-35); supreme proof would come from His empty tomb on Easter morning. *He has done all things well* reads like an epitaph on a headstone, and Jesus deserved that honor more than anyone else.

Wed James 1:17-27 From the view at the top, we are *a kind of first fruits of His creatures*—which is a picturesque way of saying that God claims us first and foremost. On the receiving end, we are given thought and speech—to speak up as God's defense witnesses. No sense getting angry about it (19-20) or using gutter language on the witness stand (21)—and our actions speak louder than our words (22-23). In sum, let's keep an eye on our own failings (23-24) while we get busy with things God has given us to do (25-27).

Thurs Psalm 146 We don't have to be Jewish to join the psalmist in praising God, for as long as we have lungs and voices, we will add our praise to God (2), for our time of grace is NOW, not later (3-4). We have good reason to praise Father, Creator of heaven and Earth, CEO over planet Earth, and the Healer of souls festering with sin (8-9). Forever more (10).

Fri Mark 8:11-21 is not a discourse about home-baked bread, but a warning against home-baked false doctrine (11-15). The disciples were slow to catch the drift (16), so Jesus spelled it out (17-20)--that He was more interested in the sourdough of false doctrine than in Taystee bread, and so are we. God's bread suits our taste, and we pray that we shall never tire of dining on it, snacking on it, and serving it wherever we can—both to ourselves and to others at our table. God's Word is heavenly manna.

Sat James 1:25 What is meant with the *perfect law of liberty*, anyway? Well, since Christ has freed us from Satan's domination (and God's condemnation), we are free as birds to serve whomever we wish. We are free to serve God and the impulses of His Holy Spirit. That's not only swell, it's perfect! Being at liberty to choose whom to serve — is a wonderful way to live.

May God bless and keep us, smile upon us, and give us peace of conscience while we serve Him as best we can, come what may! Amen, Lord Jesus!
