³³ "Hear another parable: There was a certain landowner who planted a vineyard and set a hedge around it, dug a winepress in it and built a tower. And he leased it to vinedressers and went into a far country. 34 Now when vintage-time drew near, he sent his servants to the vinedressers, that they might receive its fruit. 35 And the vinedressers took his servants, beat one, killed one, and stoned another. ³⁶ Again he sent other servants, more than the first, and they did likewise to them. ³⁷ Then last of all he sent his son to them. saying, 'They will respect my son.' 38 But when the vinedressers saw the son, they said among themselves, 'This is the heir. Building Project Update

The Messiah Building Project is rapidly coming to a conclusion. By the time you read this in the bulletin, the interior work should be 99% complete and all portions of the project ready for occupancy. Flooring by the contractor and volunteer labor should be completed by this weekend. That leaves interior furnishings such as cabinetry, white boards, projectors, desks, and similar items for completion in the new addition for this coming week. Once that is completed, the rooms are ready for everyday use.

Flooring was completed in the pastoral offices and meeting this past week and the rooms are now being furnished and occupied by the pastors. Jambs, door install, and door trim in this area will be completed this coming week.

On the exterior, the roofing contractor is still waiting on material for re-roofing the old sanctuary that will allow final tie-in of the new addition roofing with the old buildings. Other roofing items that have been on backorder arrived this week and will allow final trim to be installed on many portions of the new roof.

Retaining wall block for an extensive array of retaining wall work is on site. This is an owner install item and volunteers are hoping to start that work this week as well. The first level of blacktop has been placed on the parking lot with the final level being planned within the next week or two.

Highlights from the September 15th, 2021 Church Council Meeting

The meeting began at 5:40 pm with a devotion based on 1 Kings 20:7ff. There were 10 members present, including church officers, board chairmen, and pastors. <> Elders: Post-COVID fellowship encouragement program is continuing. Membership matters: Motions passed to accept the membership

of Ben, Robin, Charlotte, and Violet Carstensen from Peace Thru Christ, Middleton WI (pending letter), and to transfer Tara Gerbitz to Messiah Lutheran Church, Hales Corners. WI at her request. Motions passed to recommend to voters the termination of David Weiss according to Bylaw 2.08a (he is a resident of Germany, and has joined the Roman Catholic Church); Aric Reim at his request and according to Bylaw 2.08a (expressed disagreement with our teachings); Renae Markus at her request and according to Bylaw 2.08c (inactivity and requested termination). A motion passed to accept by affirmation the membership of Jack Boyea (husband of Leanne née North). Nicole LeDoux and Jason Ciokiewicz were married on August 28, 2021 at Messiah by Pastor Naumann. <> Deacons: There are no changes to services for COVID safety measures. Regular after-service Bible class is scheduled to start this weekend (Sept 18-19). Security team – dates for training have been set for Oct 9, 23, & 30 (three 8-hour days). Money for this (\$4K) will come from the Deacons budget. The Hymnal Committee is meeting again on 18th; they are working through reviews. Tech Committee – wiring has been finished in all currently-occupied classrooms. Hoping to complete the administration area and all new construction this weekend. The new phone system is up and running. Pictorial Directory – we are on track for December publication. <> Pastors: We are back on regular school schedule with youth confirmation & Bible study classes. Mission festival is coming up with Pastor Em. Vance Fossum speaking. We will also have several speakers from our foreign mission fields, via live-stream, for Bible Class. The pastors are moving into new office space; and have received some used office furnishings which were donated by members. Ruth's Retreat has started up again. A combined Great Lakes and Southeast CLC pastoral conference in Milford, OH, and will get to tour Creation Museum / Ark Encounter. Pastor Schaller will also deliver a paper to the MN conference. <> Outreach: "Here We Grow Again" starts this week; we provided "Silent Sunday School" packets. We are promoting our new building dedication on October 17th, and offering tours of the school. No fall seminar; we are looking at early in 2022 with Christian Education as a theme. Christmas VBS scheduled for Dec 12th. <> Property: We had a good turnout at the last church workdays on Aug 27-30. A lot of maintenance and building project work got done as well as getting ready for school. We had a water pipe separate during pressure testing on 9/10, requiring major clean-up. Pew fabric was repaired yesterday. Ongoing work includes church kitchen fridge repair and

replacing bulbs in the church. We have 2 applicants for the new janitor position. We received quotes to replace 5 windows in east classrooms (\$9K - \$12.5K). Pending: attic venting and carpets at Schaller parsonage, electrical panel at teacherage, gutter and fascia at two houses, narthex roof, parking lot lines, relocation of the dumpster, "no parking" signs on Harrison St entrance, and church carpet cleaning. <> Board of Education and Principal: Start of school was delayed one week due to construction. We will start Sunday School next weekend (Sept 18-19). We have all coaches and athletic schedules completed. Valerie Hammett had to resign for health reasons; Marcie Schierenbeck has been filling in until a regular call is accepted. We have had increased technology spending due to new and renovated classrooms. <> Treasurer: A motion passed to approve the current list of bills for payment as presented. General fund receipts through August are \$505K, which includes a special gift of \$30, up \$39K over last year. Disbursements are up \$50K over last year. CLC General Fund got special gift of \$20K. Received \$50K to debt retirement, and a \$10K personal loan was paid off. The Building Fund received special gift of \$50K. There were also special donations of \$15K to Messiah's ILHS Student Aid Fund, \$10K to Property Improvement, \$15K to MSF, and \$10K to Gifts & Memorials. We have many reasons for thanksgiving to God for His many blessings! <> Miscellaneous: • Building project – we are working on move-in dates for the rest of the new building. • Treasurer position: Our treasurer reported that we need someone with bookkeeping experience (or a CPA) in the position of treasurer; this will be discussed at the next meeting. A Retreat is being planned for members of various boards to discuss long-range plans for the work at Messiah. • Current Projects List: Our policy is that items on this list should be special enhancements for our congregation which cost more than \$10K. Current proposal: New hymnals, additional storage/new garage. playground equipment, and stained glass windows. • A motion passed to authorize the Tech Committee to spend up to \$2K on new video cameras for sanctuary and fellowship hall from Undesignated Gifts & Memorials. <> The next Council meetings is scheduled for Oct 27. <> The next Voters' meetings will be on Sept 26th (special call meeting) and Nov 7th (quarterly meeting with elections). > The meeting adjourned at 8:05 pm with prayer, the Lord's Prayer and the Benediction.

General Fund — August offerings were \$67,076 (including a special \$20,000 offering) VS disbursements of \$88,497, resulting in a negative monthly cash flow of --\$21,420. YTD offerings are \$60,413 short of budget needs, while YTD disbursements are \$7,491 under budget needs, resulting in an YTD negative cash flow of --\$52,922 after the 2nd month of our fiscal year. It bears repeating that the General Fund provides major subsidy for the operation of our Boards of Missions, Trustees, Regents, and Education & Publication. The General Fund budget is \$1,259,430 for the fiscal year, or \$104,952/month. It needs the regular support of all our members. Only the GF has a deficit!

ILC Operations – August revenue was \$234,031 (incl \$61,667 subsidy) VS disbursements of \$110,817, resulting in a positive YTD balance of +\$62,338. As noted last month, the Regents deficit of --\$60,875 recovered due largely to student revenue when school resumed August 23.

ILC Building Projects – August revenue: \$190 in offerings V\$ \$0 disbursements. August earnings (Dividends/Interest) were \$3,380, while unrealized market (capital) gains were \$2,294. The 2021 CLC Convention allocated \$20,000 from this account for the ILC Planning Committee to study and present a cost estimate to the 2022 Convention, not only for building a new gymnasium but also for repurposing the existing fieldhouse into a chapel/theater arts/musical arts facility.

CEF – August revenue: \$41,622 (\$25,983 loan repayments, \$15,600 market (capital) gains, \$40 offerings) VS disbursements: \$110,664 (\$100,000 Cong loan installment #1; \$2,396 Note interest paid; \$8,268 admin expenses. Over this month & the next the Trustees will fund congregational CEF construction loans of nearly \$900,000.

MDF – August revenue: \$4,211 in offerings VS disbursements of \$9,824, including \$4,850 Africa outreach; \$2,500 church building aid, & \$1,073 admin expenses.

SAF – August receipts: \$10,456 (\$5,673 SAF loan repayments & \$4,783 gifts) VS 19,536 disbursed (\$18,615 student grants, loans, & scholarships; \$920 admin expenses.

Kinship – August offerings: \$15,434 (\$12,104 offerings, \$3,330 sponsors) VS disbursed: \$8,005 (\$4,100 medical aid; \$3,010 orphanages, \$180 Sem students, \$690 widows).

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; Sept. 13-18, '21

Mon Isaiah 35:1-7a is part of a larger unit; we already know other chapters of His-story. Idolaters are in for punishment (ch. 34), while God's people receive chastening to strengthen them (1-4) for their earthly pilgrimage.

God promised to invigorate ancient Israel for a new life (5-6) in a regenerated country (7)--which sounds much like a preview of heaven.

Tues Mark 7:31-37 In due time, Isaiah's prophecy came to pass, for God sent His Son down to our planet--providing visual and audible proof that God had not forsaken humanity (31-35); supreme proof would come from His empty tomb on Easter morning. He has done all things well reads like an epitaph on a headstone, and Jesus deserved that honor more than anyone else.

Wed James 1:17-27 From the view at the top, we are a kind of first fruits of His creatures—which is a picturesque way of saying that God claims us first and foremost. On the receiving end, we are given thought and speech—to speak up as God's defense witnesses. No sense getting angry about it (19-20) or using gutter language on the witness stand (21)—and our actions speak louder than our words (22-23). In sum, let's keep an eye on our own failings (23-24) while we get busy with things God has given us to do (25-27).

Thurs Psalm 146 We don't have to be Jewish to join the psalmist in praising God, for as long as we have lungs and voices, we will add our praise to God (2), for our time of grace is NOW, not later (3-4). We have good reason to praise Father, Creator of heaven and Earth, CEO over planet Earth, and the Healer of souls festering with sin (8-9). Forever more (10).

Fri Mark 8:11-21 is not a discourse about home-baked bread, but a warning against home-baked false doctrine (11-15). The disciples were slow to catch the drift (16), so Jesus spelled it out (17-20)--that He was more interested in the sourdough of false doctrine than in Taystee bread, and so are we. God's bread suits our taste, and we pray that we shall never tire of dining on it, snacking on it, and serving it wherever we can—both to ourselves and to others at our table. God's Word is heavenly manna.

Sat James 1:25 What is meant with the *perfect law of liberty*, anyway? Well, since Christ has freed us from Satan's domination (and God's condemnation), we are free as birds to serve whomever we wish. We are free to serve God and the impulses of His Holy Spirit. That's not only swell, it's perfect! Being at liberty to choose whom to serve — is a wonderful way to live.

May God bless and keep us, smile upon us, and give us peace of conscience while we serve Him as best we can, come what may! Amen, Lord Jesus!
