¹⁶ So the LORD said to Moses: "Gather to Me seventy men of the elders of Israel, whom you know to be the elders of the people and officers over them; bring them to the tabernacle of meeting, that they may stand there with you. ... ²⁴ So Moses went out and told the people the words of the LORD, and he gathered the seventy men of the elders of the people and placed them around the tabernacle. ²⁵ Then the LORD came down in the cloud, and spoke to him, and took of the Spirit that was upon him, and placed the same upon the seventy elders; and it happened, when the Spirit rested upon them, that they prophesied, although they never did so again. ²⁶ But two men had remained in the camp: the name of one was Eldad, and the name of the other Medad. The Obituary of Mabel Joyce Noeldner

Psalm 103:1-2 Bless the LORD, O my soul; And all that is within me, bless His holy name! Bless the LORD, O my soul, And forget not all His benefits:

The LORD is to be blessed by us for His gift of Mabel Joyce ("Mae") born on May 1, 1933 to Chester Lohr Sr. and his wife, Thelma nee Dahl. Mae was born in Goodwin, South Dakota. She was third in a family of 6 girls and 3 boys.

Psalm 103:11-12 For as the heavens are high above the earth, So great is His mercy toward those who fear Him; As far as the east is from the west, So far has He removed our transgressions from us.

One of the chief benefits from the LORD was His handling of sin for Mae. The Savjor's work on Calvary removed all sin of all the world, as far as the east is from the west. Mae was baptized and all her sin washed away by God's Spirit on April 12, 1940 at the St. John's Evangelical Lutheran parsonage in Rauville Township, South Dakota. Mae was confirmed on July 20, 1947 at the same church and was spiritually nourished through her life-long study of God's Word and use of the Savior's Supper.

Psalm 103:4-5 [The LORD] Who redeems your life from destruction, Who crowns you with lovingkindness and tender mercies, Who satisfies your mouth with good things, So that your youth is renewed like the eagle's.

On June 28, 1953, the LORD blessed Mae with a Christian husband, Orville Edwin Noeldner, The couple was married at St. Martin's Lutheran Church of Watertown, South Dakota. He added the blessing of 1 daughter and 4 sons. The young couple farmed in rural Codington County, In 1975 the family moved to Eau Claire, Wisconsin to further the Christian education of their children. Mae held various jobs over the years including work at an optical store, a restaurant, an apple orchard, watching children and cleaning houses. But she focused on her role as a Christian wife and mother and eventually her grand mothering of 25 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. She especially enjoyed sewing, and made the best bread, pickles, pies and cookies. The LORD blessed her with a cheerful disposition, a love for people, and the ability to let her light shine, giving witness to her Father in heaven.

Psalm 103:3 [The LORD] Who forgives all your iniquities, Who heals all your diseases.

The message of forgiveness in Christ Jesus was most precious for Mae and her husband. They both were very active in their local church and larger fellowship in their use and support of the Gospel. In obedience to the Word of God, they left their former church and fellowship when it fell into error and became founding members of Trinity Lutheran Church in Watertown, South Dakota and in the new fellowship, the Church of the Lutheran Confession. Upon moving to Eau Claire, they became active members of Messiah Lutheran Church.

In contrast to the brief, passing existence of human beings, an existence filled with sin and death, God has established through Jesus Christ an eternal Kingdom of forgiveness and life. The LORD granted eternal life to Mae's beloved husband Orville in March of 2012. In the years since, Mae lived on her own and until recently enjoyed good health. She began to have some health issues and moved in August to Heritage Court where the LORD ended her earthly pilgrimage of 88 years, 4 months, and 23 days on September 24, 2021 by giving her the gift of eternal life. Her body was cremated and the ashes placed earlier today at Lakeview Cemetery in Eau Claire.

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; Oct. 4-9, '21

Mon Numbers 11:14-16,24-29 As pastor of the nation, captain of the army, and CEO of the entire expedition, Moses needed help; so God downloaded His Spirit onto seventy assistants and sent them out to the church campus. But wait a minute (!) — only 68 arrived, for two had stayed back and were preaching in their neighborhoods. What looked like a crisis (27-28) was not insubordination but a blessing, so Moses not only defended them, he prayed that God would inspire all His children to do likewise. We say **Amen** to that!

Tues Mark 9:38-50 What other churches/denominations do as religious work is between them and God, so we neither support nor interfere with them (38-41). Instead, we focus on our own privileged responsibility to the next generation (42) as we cope with our own sinful nature (43-48) and as we help our neighbors (49-50). *Salt is good*, but in olden times it was not refined, and impurities could ruin its effectiveness. Let's not sully our saltiness!

Wed James 4:7-12 Where or how does a person get started with God? Start with acknowledging His superiority and with knowing one's own inferiority (7-10). When you appreciate being squared with God (via Jesus Christ), then you get squared with your neighbor—especially your Christian siblings (11-12), avoiding slander as well as a judgmental mentality. God is well equipped to do His business with sinners, so we do not undercut Him (11-12).

Thurs Psalm 51:1-13 Did you sin? Yes. What are you going to do about it? Turn to God, confess specific sins (1-4), admit that you were born that way (5-6) and ask God to wash you clean from that defect, too (7-9). Bottom line: God performs a heart transplant operation on His children (10-11) and His Spirit keeps cleaning them in a rotten world (12-13). God is good at it.

Fri Mark 9:43-48 presents a scary view of going to hell—and Jesus is pointing out that we should do whatever is necessary to escape hell. Although our limbs may perform sinfully, sinfulness is embedded more deeply than that, for sinfulness seeks a home in our minds/hearts. So, first and foremost, what we need are renewed hearts, which will then activate our hands, feet, and eyes as servants of spiritual righteousness (and civic uprightness, too).

Sat James 4:11-12 Second thoughts on the judgmental syndrome: A person with an inferiority complex is driven to feel superior to others and thus sits in judgment over others. That's acting like God, who gets it right every time—whereas the sinful judge is working with a defective heart. Luther knew that God and His servant James are directing us to defend our neighbor, speak well of him, and put the best construction on everything that our neighbor may be saying or doing. God help us!
