 9 Therefore, a Sabbath rest remains for God's people. 10 For the person who has entered his rest has rested from his own works, just as God did from his.

¹¹ Let us, then, make every effort to enter that rest, so that no one will fall into the same pattern of disobedience.

¹² For the word of God is living and effective and sharper than any double-edged sword, penetrating as far as the separation of soul and spirit, joints and marrow. It is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart. ¹³ No creature is hidden from him, but all things are naked and exposed to the eyes of him to whom we must give an account.

¹⁴Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens—Jesus the Son of God—let us hold fast to our confession. ¹⁵ For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who has been tempted in every way as we are, yet without sin. ¹⁶Therefore, let us approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in time of need.

Sermon 2 Kings 5:1-15 (NKJV)

5 Now Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Syria, was a great and honorable man in the eyes of his master, because by him the LORD had given victory to Syria. He was also a mighty man of valor, *but* a leper. ² And the Syrians had gone out on raids, and had brought back captive a young girl from the land of Israel. She waited on Naaman's wife. ³ Then she said to her mistress, "If only my master *were* with the prophet who *is* in Samaria! For he would heal him of his leprosy." ⁴ And *Naaman* went in and told his master, saying, "Thus and thus said the girl who *is* from the land of Israel."

⁵ Then the king of Syria said, "Go now, and I will send a letter to the king of Israel."

So he departed and took with him ten talents of silver, six thousand *shekels* of gold, and ten changes of clothing. ⁶Then he brought the letter to the king of Israel, which said,

Now be advised, when this letter comes to you, that I have sent Naaman my servant to you, that you may heal him of his leprosy.

⁷ And it happened, when the king of Israel read the letter, that he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to kill and make alive, that this man sends a man to me to heal him of his leprosy? Therefore please consider, and see how he seeks a quarrel with me."

⁸ So it was, when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, that he sent to the king, saying, "Why have you torn your clothes? Please let him come to me, and he shall know that there is a prophet in Israel."


⁹ Then Naaman went with his horses and chariot, and he stood at the door of Elisha's house. ¹⁰ And Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, "Go and wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored to you, and *you shall* be clean." ¹¹ But Naaman became furious, and went away and said, "Indeed, I said to myself, 'He will surely come out *to me*, and stand and call on the name of the LORD his God, and wave his hand over the place, and heal the leprosy.' ¹² Are not the Abanah and the Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them and be clean?" So he turned and went away in a rage. ¹³ And his servants came near and spoke to him, and said, "My father, *if* the prophet had told you *to do* something great, would you not have done *it*? How much more then, when he says to you, 'Wash, and be clean'?" ¹⁴ So he went down and dipped seven times in the Jordan, according to the saying of the man of God; and his flesh was restored like the flesh of a little child, and he was clean.

¹⁵ And he returned to the man of God, he and all his aides, and came and stood before him; and he said, "Indeed, now I know that *there is* no God in all the earth, except in Israel; now therefore, please take a gift from your servant."


CLC Southeastern Women's Retreat will take place in Myrtle Beach, SC, on November 5-7. There are details on the kiosk in the narthex.

How is My Mission Offering Used?

We are privileged to share in the work of God's Kingdom with our sister congregations in the Church of the Lutheran Confession (CLC).

Offerings that are designated for "Missions" are contributions to the General Fund of the CLC. These offerings support our mission of sharing the Gospel through Christian Education at Immanuel Lutheran High School, College and Seminary (Regents); supporting mission congregations and outreach in North America, Asia, and Africa; supporting Christian Education and Publishing (Education and Publications); and funding the business expenses of our church body (Trustees).

Offerings to the CLC General Fund are budgeted for the various ministries that we have undertaken as a church body. The budgeted total revenue for this fiscal year (July 1, 2021 —June 30, 2022) is \$1,259, 430.

Board of Regents — The CLC subsidizes the Christian education at Immanuel Lutheran High School, College, and Seminary (ILC) in Eau Claire. In this fiscal year, the total ILC operating budget is \$1,448,120. The synodical subsidy is 51% of the operating budget. The balance of the operating expenses are funded via student revenue. www.ilc.edu

Board of Missions — Funding for domestic missions—currently five mission congregations, and foreign missions—aid to various sister church bodies in foreign fields, two full time missionaries, and additional part-time missionaries. **www.lutheranmissions.org**

Board of Education and Publications — Funding for various publishing projects, the CLC website, and providing resources and encouragement in Christian education. The Board of Education and Publications oversees the synod's periodical magazines and the CLC Book House.

Board of Trustees — Funding to administer the financial affairs of the church body and the "Old Retirement Plan" of the CLC.

Additional Funds have been created to support various efforts in the CLC as offerings allow. None of your Mission offerings go to these funds, however, an offering can be designated for these funds at any time.

Mission Development Fund (MDF) — This fund finances various extrabudgetary projects and aid efforts. Examples of MDF projects: Bibles for missions, translations, exploratory mission work, rice aid in India, bicycles, motorcycles, disaster relief.

Kinship supports orphans in India, Nigeria, East Africa, Nepal as well as seminary students and pastors' widows. Kinship also provides aid after natural disasters and for other humanitarian needs among our foreign missions.

Student Aid Fund (SAF) — This fund supports the grants, loans, and workstudy offered to students at ILC in an effort to make the Christian education at ILC as affordable as possible.

ILC Improvement Fund (IIF) — These funds are used for larger maintenance and capital improvement projects on the ILC campus and its buildings.

Church Extension Fund (CEF) — These resources are loaned to congregations at low mortgage rates for building projects. Mortgage payments replenish the fund.

General Fund – September offerings were \$100,472 (Ave needs \$105,000) VS disbursements of \$117,716, a negative monthly cash flow of --\$17,244. YTD offerings are \$65,000 short of budget needs, while YTD disbursements are \$5,000 over budgeted expenses, resulting in the General Fund deficit of --\$70,000 after the 3rd month of our fiscal year. The General Fund provides \$1,260,000 of subsidy for the operation of our Boards of Missions, Regents, Trustees, and Education & Publication and needs the regular support of all our members.

- ILC Operations September revenue was \$142,668 (incl \$61,667 subsidy) VS disbursements of \$120,777, resulting in a positive YTD balance of \$84,000. As previously noted, the Regents -\$60,000 deficit for July recovered quickly in August from student revenue when school resumed. Student revenue comes in steadily as most parents make regular monthly payments on their student accounts. Some pay for the whole semester in the first month. There are 120 enrolled in the 3 depts.
- ILC Building Projects September revenue: \$895 in offerings V\$ \$9,862 in disbursements for design fees and related expenses from the 2021 CLC Convention's \$20,000 allocation for the ILC Planning Committee to study and present a cost estimate to the 2022 Convention for the proposed new gymnasium and repurposing the existing fieldhouse. September earnings (Dividends/Interest) were \$3,925, while changes in principal (capital) value were negative \$22,301 due to market conditions. Fluctuations are expected in our portfolio value each month and the net gain or loss YTD is reported in the chart above for this fund (& IIF, CEF, & SAF). Realized dividends & interest earnings for the Bldg Fund for the 3 months of this fiscal year are \$11,953.
- CEF September revenue: \$29,388 loan repayments, \$50 offerings VS disbursements: \$437,844 (\$425,000 Cong loan construction draw #2; \$8,823 Note interest paid; \$4,021 admin expenses).
- MDF September revenue: \$10,713 in offerings VS disbursements of \$11,725, including \$2,500 Africa/Asia outreach; \$6,000 church building aid, \$1,200 cycles, & \$1,125 admin expenses.
- SAF September receipts: \$3,820 (SAF loan repayments & gifts) VS 19,536 disbursed (\$7,809 student grants, loans, & scholarships; \$920 admin expenses.

Kinship – September offerings: \$8,384 offerings & sponsors VS disbursed: \$22,937 (\$13,832 orphanages, \$8,850 Seminary student sponsorships).

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; Oct. 25-30, '21

Mon Isaiah 53:10-12 stops us in our tracks and opens the great mystery of the planning that lay behind Christmas, Calvary, and Easter. The LORD God did not begrudge sending Messiah Jesus down to our planet but was <u>pleased</u> to redeem and reclaim humanity from a fate worse than death. Jesus would make His soul an offering for sin and would prosper in bearing their/our iniquities, and **therefore** receive the acclimation He deserved. Hallelujah!

Tues Mark 10:35-45 Those adults were acting like children—trying to elbow their way to the head of the line (35-37), failing to realize it would put them on track to Calvary (38-39). Besides, the table seating in heaven had already been set (40). Since the virus of selfishness was spreading (41), Jesus clarified that God values the giving of service rather the receiving of service (45).

Wed Hebrews 4:11-16 God can read our minds, so He knows what nobody else knows about us; He can read our diaries, tune in on our daydreams, poke around in our garbage (11-13)--and instead of being revolted, God *sympathizes with our weakness* and invites us to *come boldly to the throne of grace*, *to obtain mercy* (not condemnation) and *find grace* (not grumpiness) *to help* (not hamper) us *in our time of need*. **God is our refuge!**

Thurs Psalm 22 lets us read Jesus' heart as He claims no favor from God (1-2) while He favored others (3-5) even when He was stepped on (6) and mocked (7-8). "I have gone from being favored (9-11) to being victimized (12-13), to suffering, (14-15) and to execution (16-18). Nevertheless, I turn to Thee, dear Father, for help (19-21), and I praise Thee (22-26). In mercy reach out to others (27-29) even unto future generations (30-31)." Amen.

Fri Mark 11:27-33 Disbelievers have an appetite for trying to discredit our Savior (27-28). In this case, Jesus turned the tables on them with a question they declined to answer—for they would get into trouble either way, whether they approved or disapproved of John the Baptizer. How sad that they slunk away from this blessed opportunity to admit they were fighting a losing battle — and they should simply surrender to Jesus. Lord, have mercy!

Sat Hebrews 6:1-8 Those who are familiar with basic Christian doctrines (1-2) may wonder and worry about those who have fallen through the cracks. More precisely, when someone turns his back on the Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier and is sliding toward hell - - is there no hope for such a soul?

Our Savior's word in Matthew 19:26 supplies the solution: While it is impossible for us to renew them again to repentance, it is not impossible for God. Dear God, grant such a miracle of grace and such a reformation!
