

### Sermon.....Jeremiah 18:1-11

<sup>1</sup> The word which came to Jeremiah from the LORD, saying: <sup>2</sup> "Arise and go down to the potter's house, and there I will cause you to hear My words." <sup>3</sup> Then I went down to the potter's house, and there he was, making something at the wheel. <sup>4</sup> And the vessel that he made of clay was marred in the hand of the potter; so he made it again into another vessel, as it seemed good to the potter to make. <sup>5</sup> Then the word of the LORD came to me, saying: 6 "O house of Israel, can I not do with you as this potter?" says the LORD. "Look, as the day is in the potter's hand, so are you in My hand, O house of Israel! <sup>7</sup> The instant I speak concerning a nation and concerning a kingdom, to pluck up, to pull down, and to destroy it, 8 if that nation against whom I have spoken turns from its evil. Return now every one from his evil way, and make your ways and your doings good."'"

Communion next weekend: During next week's services, we will celebrate the sacrament of Holy Communion. You may register for the sacrament on the sheets provided on the table in the narthex or fellowship hall or by speaking to one of the pastors. As an aid to self-examination we offer this:

Communion days are the great festive days of the Christian Church. Communion itself is the Holy of Holies, the very climax of the Christian life. There the most intimate union between the Savior and the believer takes place.

The Sacrament of Holy Communion was instituted and ordained by Christ just before His sufferings and death. It is His last Will and Testament or Bequest, given to His disciples, His Church. "Do this," He said, "take, eat; this is My Body, which is given for you...Drink all of you from it, this cup is My Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for many, for the remission of sins: this do as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me." Such was Christ's command. The apostles understood; the Apostolic Church understood; and thus, from the very beginning of the Church, the "Breaking of Bread," i.e., the celebration of Holy Communion, has been the holiest and most sacred rite of the Church. Read what the book of Acts says: (Ch. 2: 42; 20:7); what Paul says (I Cor. 10:15, 16; 11:26-29); what John says: (I John 5:8).

Holy Communion still is the Holy of Holies in the Lutheran Church. Would to God that all might realize this, and faithfully and frequently enter into this sanctuary to enjoy the privilege of communing at the Lord's Table, commemorating His death, and receiving from Him that holy "meat and drink," His own Body and Blood, the food of eternal life!

### Highlights from the October 27<sup>th</sup> 2021 Church Council Meeting

The meeting began at 5:38 pm with a devotion based on Luke 13:22-24. There were 9 members present, including church officers, board chairmen, and pastors.
Elders: Membership matters: Motion passed to accept the membership of Dave & Roxy Fuerstenau from Holy Truth, Ketchikan, AK. Motion passed to recommend

to voters the termination of Trudy Herdrich according to bylaw 2.08a, at her request. Baptisms: Marissa Leigh Friedrichs on July 13 by L. Dale Redlin, Emery Christine Mikesell on July 18 by Pastor Tiefel, & Imogen Kendall Rose Friedrichs on October 1 by Pastor Tiefel. Victory Service: Mabel Noeldner on Sept 28 at Messiah by Pastor Tiefel. The Pastors have prepared a document regarding the role of women in the church as it pertains to Messiah. Pastor Naumann shared it with the Council; the Elders will discuss at their next meeting. <> Deacons: All appointees have agreed to continue serving through 2021. Security team - Final day of training will be this Saturday, 15 members and 2 teachers are participating. Tech Committee – wiring for new construction is complete, audio issues have been resolved. Installed new HD camera for streaming services. <> Pastors: Pastors still meet weekly. Pastor Tiefel will be taking midweek Advent services, while Pastors Naumann and Schaller cover weekends. They and the Elders are following up on contact with inactive members. Pastor Naumann, Teacher Roehl and Samantha Kelly are organizing the Christmas Eve service this year. The weekend Bible class series is on the Psalms; we will be reevaluating Sunday Evening Bible class for 2022. They are working with Deacons on service schedule for next year. <> Outreach is preparing for Christmas VBS (Dec 12th). We are looking at arranging for a new billboard this fall, and are promoting the Missions Webinar on Nov. 13th. Ideas are being considered for next year's activities. <> Property: The most recent church work day was Sept 25, turnout was small. We re-lined part of parking lot and repaired some electrical issues. In-Progress: Repair kitchen fridge, get permanent "no parking" signs on Harrison St, relocate garbage and dumpster to Harrison St to improve snow removal, convert 3 non-working lights to LED on east side of school, cut and install corner supports for church secretary's desk. Create more structured BOP role guidance. Pending items: various fixes and upgrades at the Schaller parsonage and teacherage. Check and seal leak in narthex roof in corner on north side. Create BOP "routine maintenance" document. Clean carpets in church, Wasps in Fellowship Hall & kitchen areas, Address north school flood lights shining into neighbor's house/vard. Future projects: (would require additional funding): (a) Replace 5 east side school windows. We have several quotes. Motion tabled to go with Asher window and installation (we need voter approval for this amount). Other quotes will be considered. (b) Replace electrical panel at the teacherage, ~\$2,500. A motion passed to spend up to \$3,000 from the Property Improvement Fund for this. <> Board of Education and Principal: Principal Schaller is nearing the end of his quarantine due to a COVID case in his household. Mrs. Marcie Schierenbeck will be installed this weekend. We have a coordinator for December VBS. Fall athletics are done, and we have coaches in place for winter sports. One second grade student has left to be homeschooled, and have one new 7th grade student. The students are using the new restrooms this week; we plan to use new classrooms and entrance next week, School office move is TBD. <> Treasurer: A motion passed to approve the current list of bills for payment as presented. General Fund receipts and disbursements both about \$558K which included about 380,000 for the building project. We are thankful to have received some large special donations recently. Total contributions are about \$1.1M, compared to \$847K last year. <> **Building project** - classrooms are moving in this week, school office will be later. There are a number of unfinished items: storage shed, signage, entry sign, replacing flooring, replacing cabinetry, lighting on east side of building. There may be some money in the building project to do these things, if the voters decide to do that. President will appoint committees to address these. Seth has a draft plan for interior signing. All boards to get estimates for items that they feel should be included in the building project so they can be considered by the voters at the December meeting, prior to finalizing the CEF loan. • Responsibility for space use and decor. A motion carried to split responsibility among boards: Board of Ed responsible for everything north of double doors except for "blue room." Deacons are responsible for everything south of double doors plus the "blue room." Board of Property is responsible for all maintenance/utility areas. This is with the understanding that the boards cooperate on shared spaces (fellowship hall, cry room, nursery, etc.). <> 2022 Budget: The Treasurer presented a projected budget at ~5% increase over the current year not counting any changes from the Compensation Committee. A motion carried to increase the Property Improvement Fund transfer from \$3,000 to \$6,000. A motion carried to recommend this preliminary budget to the voters (pending any Compensation Committee action). <> Treasurer position: We are considering whether to gradually transfer some duties to a bookkeeper position. Pres. Oster will introduce this concept to the voters. <> Miscellaneous: • A motion passed to contribute Stewardship Sunday offering envelope donations to the Property Improvement Fund. • A retreat will be held early next year with Messiah Board members. We will discuss each board's long-range plans and challenges. • Spending limits: Reviewed spending limits for various funds, etc. We will recommend any proposed changes to the voters, perhaps in Dec. • A motion passed to recommend guidelines for the Current Projects Fund to the voters. This fund is intended for (but not limited to) projects that are (1) one-time expenses (not on-going), (2) intended to enhance Messiah's buildings, property, or programs, and (3) are estimated to cost between \$10,000 - \$100,000. The Current Project List will be maintained by the Council and periodically approved by the Voters. Spending from this fund can only be approved by the Voters. • Altar Committee: A motion passed that we authorize up to \$300 for altar linens, from the Undesignated Memorials Fund. <> The next Council meetings are scheduled for Nov 15<sup>th</sup> and Dec 8<sup>th</sup>. <> The next Voter's meetings are scheduled for Nov 7<sup>th</sup> – (quarterly and elections) meeting); Dec 12<sup>th</sup> - special budget meeting; Jan 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2022 - annual meeting, installation of new board members and officers is scheduled for Dec 18-19. <> The meeting adjourned at 8:42 PM with the Lord's Prayer and the Benediction.

The Ladies of Messiah met on Monday, October 25 to revisit pre-Covid plans and to discuss the future of the group. It was decided that the positions of the following officers need to be filled as soon as possible: President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Amanda Hestekin has volunteered to be considered for the position of President. The group also discussed the roles of several sub-committees, summarized briefly below:



- 1) Altar Committee: Currently being served by Paula Naumann, Cindy Schlegelmilch, Emily Schlegelmilch, Eileen Tiefel, and Connie Wittorp. This group is responsible for the altar cloths, candles, floral arrangements, and communion ware.
- 2) Kitchen: Leader of this group is Lynette Roehl. The Kitchen Committee is responsible for funeral meals, potlucks, and any other function involving the church kitchen and the serving/cleanup of meals. Each female member 18 and over is automatically added to one of three Kitchen Groups. Each Kitchen Group has two leaders, in charge of calling on their group members when it is their group's turn to either prepare food, serve, or clean up after a meal or event. There is a need for two new group leaders.
- 3) Activities: This is a new committee responsible for the planning and/or facilitating of various events such as craft nights, soup or cookie exchanges, holiday parties, outdoor picnics, activities for singles or young adults, etc. There are many volunteers for this committee, but a committee leader is still needed.
- 4) Member Monitor Committee: This is a new committee responsible for tracking various milestones among members (births, graduations, new marriages) and staying in touch with those who may have needs (shut-ins, new moms, widows and widowers, sick or hospitalized persons and their families) and will organized meal trains, visits, and gifts wherever there is need. The Cradle Roll (currently served by Dotty Lillo and Beth Sydow) will become a sub-committee of this group. Amanda Roth has volunteered to be the leader of this committee.
- 5) Quiet Bag Maintenance: Hannah Graff has offered to serve as leader for this committee. Other volunteers to help as needed would be welcome.

Anyone who might be willing and able to serve as either an elected officer, sub-committee leader, or a kitchen group leader is asked to please contact Jessi Scheberl either by email (jessica scheberl@live.com) or by calling/texting 715.379.6716. The group plans to elect officers and sub-committee leaders at the next meeting, which is tentatively planned for **Monday, November 15**<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 pm.

### Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions; Nov. 1-6, '21

Mon Jeremiah 18:1-11 Ancient Palestinians suffered much from foreigners, and God was using them to bring Israel to repentance. Israel's problem was common to humans: moral degeneration which begins with individuals (11) and soon infects the entire nation. Unrepented sin brings disastrous consequences; on the other hand, God relents and rebuilds a future for repentant individuals and repentant nations. [It sounds current, doesn't it?]

**Tues Mark 13:1-11** Jesus upgraded Jeremiah's warning for the Jews (1-2), which fits our world, too (5-8). *So watch out for yourselves*, Christians, for you will be persecuted and face court trials (9). When that happens to you, God's Holy Spirit will give you the right responses for a testimony to/against them. [Martin Luther was blessed via that experience; praise the Lord!]

**Wed Revelation 14:6-7** *Angel* = messenger, and this one was air-borne so he could broadcast his message *to all those who dwell on the Earth—to every nation, tribe, tongue, and people, saying with a loud voice, "Revere God and give glory to Him, for your time of grace has evaporated! Get down on your knees and <i>worship Him who created* a viable *Earth* until He finishes it off in flames [2 Peter 3:10]. Martin Luther was God's messenger, and today many others are using the air-waves to broadcast God's Word.

**Thurs Psalm 46** Since *God is our Refuge and Strength, a very present help in trouble*, we can face catastrophes (1-3) from a safe place (4-5). Even if Europe, Asia, Africa, Indonesia, and the Americas go berserk, we will *take refuge in the God of Jacob* (cf. Genesis 28:13-15). When life gets scary, let's remind ourselves that God is still behind the steering wheel (8-9). That knowledge helps us o quit complaining (10). Repeat. Repeat.

**Fri Matthew 24:1-14** We are less interested in the Temple than the disciples were; they were impressed, Jesus was not. We are more interested in the next question: "What will be the sign of Your coming, and of the end of the age?" They wanted advance notice on the arrival of Judgment Day. Here are the clues: False saviors will deceive many, wars and natural disasters will multiply; you will be targeted, too. There's only one redeeming factor that will prepare humanity for meeting Jesus (14). God grant it!

**Sat 1 Corinthians 1:4-9** Let's sit down and count our blessings. We have been <u>given</u> the grace of God via Christ Jesus; we have been enriched in every-which way via Jesus; God has not begrudged us any blessing, and He has pledged to carry us through to the end, so that we may be blameless in the day of our Lord, Jesus Christ. God is dependable! Count on it (9)! Amen and Amen!
